The fever in Philadelphia had nearly subsided, only one case appeared to the 9th of last month.

Accounts received from the Havannah state that the Spaniards are swarming with insurgent privateers chiefly to Commodore Aery, who commands a squadron of thirteen vessels, two of which entered the port of Guanaja, and captured a schooner; an English ship from Havana was plundered by one of them.

Spanish vessels are completely blockaded in the port of the Havannah in consequence of this circumstance.

French Refugees are again endeavouring to take a stand in the Province of Texas, having organized a force of 2000 men well equipped.

Accounts had been received at Lisbon, of Mr. Marre-ford's sailing from Rio Janeiro, for Portugal, with considerable sum in specie; but it was ascertained he would be informed, at sea, of the capture of the ship, which would probably alter his project.

British Monitor says, that in order to prevent the treasure falling into the hands of the new Government, it is reported that a British frigate, is to be sent to the bar of Lisbon, to apprehend the Lord of the Revolution which had taken place.

Spain has ordered a reinforcement of 25,000 men to her army.

The Duke of Wellington as representative of the British Government, will attend the Congress at Troop.

At Southampton, October 19.—Monday, Rear-Admiral Sir Thomas Boscawen, arrived here in the Minerva, of 74 guns.

William Patterson, C. B. from Trinidad, arrived here on the 14th, and the Minerva sailed on the 15th of May, leaving there the Leander, Liverpool, and Curzon. The squadron, which was distributed in various directions, were healthy; there had not been much sickness since the 1st, and St Helena on the 15th of August, the ship was in good health, but would not see Mr. R.

The greatest cordiality existed between the Government and the Admiralty. The Heron, Brisen, Vigil, and one other ship, were left at St. Helena; the Minerva being left here in the Cape; and the Tern and the late of France; all the above ships were in a state, both at St Helena and the Cape.
