

Waterford Artillery Barrack is to be appropriated to the use of the Limerick Artillery Barrack.

Major-General Sir Thomas Brisbane, K. C. B. Commanding at Cork, is appointed Governor New South Wales, in the room of Major-General L. Macquarie.

Mr. Anthony Perrier is elected Mayor of Cork, to the satisfaction of its inhabitants.

Thomas P. Maunsell, Esq. brother of the late Maunsell of Limerick, is appointed High Sheriff of Northamptonshire; and Sir Edward Baker High Sheriff of Dorsetshire.

A Dublin Paper, of Monday, states, that Mr. Jean Burton refused Briefs on Saturday, in consequence of his appointment to a Judge's seat on the King's Bench. Mr. Baron George, after twenty-six years service, will be succeeded by Mr. Serjeant Lefroy.

It has been confidently stated, that the Lord of Justice of the King's Bench is to be succeeded by the present Attorney-General; and Mr. Inckett, to be the new Attorney-General, with a view to the Chancellorship, when that high office shall happen to be vacant.

Earl Clare has arrived at Mountshannon.

The Sheriffs of Cork have declined to call on the Queen.

In consequence of the recommendation of the Chamber of Commerce (as published in our last issue) a considerable quantity of business was done for the first time in the Exchange line, by the merchants and traders of this City at the Commercial Building, Reading Room on Monday. The exchange was on Mondays and Thursdays from two till five o'clock, to commence and end by ring at 11.

Extract of Letter received at our Office, dated Limerick, Sunday:—"Friday night a large sail belonging to Mr. Berry, was sunk by a band of robbers near this town; they beat the men and threw them down in the after cabin—they then ran the boat against one of the banks, and out a square with an ax, and sunk her with a valuable cargo, consisting of several chests of tea and hundreds of sugar—in consequence of this outrage and the disturbed state of this neighbourhood, we were obliged to get soldiers quartered along the canal yesterday evening, at six o'clock, the Post-Office, carrying our Mail for Dublin, came back in an hour to our Post-office, saying he lost the mail off his back, where it had been buckled like a sapsack. It weighed nearly a quarter of a cwt, and the carrier on horseback.—He can give no account of it whatsoever. There were many cut-throats, and, I fear, some whole ones, in it.—There have been no tidings of it this day, though every general inquiry has been made.

"It is supposed that the bag was given by the thief to an accomplice."

Friday evening, a very beautiful American schooner, laden with 540 bales of Tobacco, was brought into Cork harbour, by the *Dottel* sloop-war, which vessel she had captured hovering about that coast with the intent of smuggling her cargo.

His Majesty's ship *Fly*, Captain Coffin, sailed from Galway, last week, on a cruise.

On Thursday last, about one o'clock, Mr. Stewart, of the Revenue Police, quartered in Dublin, left his lodgings, taking with him a razor, and has not since been heard of. His mental faculties were not quite settled this time back, in consequence of a heavy fit of sickness under which he laboured. The general opinion is, that he is drowned himself; if so, he has left a wife and seven children to lament his untimely end.

Sunday night, some villains broke into the stable at Shannon-park, the property of Mr. O'Farrell, and stole a quantity of ducks and turkeys. A similar robbery was committed a few nights before at Attyfin farm-yard, in this County.

The following is a statement of the number of prisoners admitted and discharged from the County Jail, since the 3d of August last, being a Commission Day of last Assizes:—Admitted, 14; discharged, 234; in custody on Saturday, 134.
