

Waterford Artillery Barrack is to be appropriated to the use of the Lines.

Commanding at Cork, is appointed Governor New South Wales, in the room of Major-General L. Macquarie.

If Anthony Perier is elected Mayor of Cork, it is to the satisfaction of its inhabitants.

Thomas P. Maunsell, Esq., brother of the Deacon of Limerick, is appointed High Sheriff of Northamptonshire; and Sir Edward Baker High Sheriff of Dorsetshire.

Dublin Paper, of Monday, states, that Mr. Jeant Burton refused Briefs on Saturday, in consequence of his appointment to a Judge's seat the King's Bench. Mr. Baron George, after forty-six years service, will be succeeded by Sergeant Lefroy.

It has been confidently stated, that the Lord of Justice of the King's Bench is to be succeeded by the present Attorney-General; and Mr. Inkett, to be the new Attorney-General, with promise of the Chancellorship, when that high office shall happen to be vacant.

Earl Clare has arrived at Mountshannon. The Sheriff of Cork have declined to call a meeting to address the Queen.

In consequence of the recommendation of the Chamber of Commerce (as published in our last) considerable quantity of business was done for first time in the Exchange line, by the merchants and traders of this City at the Commercial Building Reading Room on Monday. The exchanges are Mondays and Thursdays from two till six o'clock, to commence and end by ring of bells.

Extract of Letter received at our Office, dated Londonderry, Sunday:—“ Friday night a large sail belonging to Mr. Berry, was sunk by a band of villains near this town; they beat the men and them down in the after cabin—they then ran boat against one of the banks, and cut a square hole with an ax, and sunk her with a valuable cargo, consisting of several chests of tea and large bags of sugar—in consequence of this outrage the disturbed state of this neighbourhood, we are to get soldiers quartered along the canal, yesterday, evening, at six o'clock, the Post-boy, carrying our Mail for Dublin, came back in an hour to our Post-office, saying he lost the mail off his back, where it had been buckled like aapsack. It weighed nearly a quarter of a cwt, the carrier on horseback.—He can give no account of it whatsoever. There were many cutters, and, I fear, some whole ones, in it. There have been no tidings of it this day, though every general inquiry has been made.”

“ It is supposed that the bag was given by the carrier to an accomplice.”

Friday evening, a very beautiful American hooner, laden with 540 bales of Tobacco, was brought into Cork harbour, by the *Darterel* sloop of war, which vessel she had captured hovering off that coast with the intent of smuggling her cargo.

His Majesty's ship *Fly*, Captain Coffin, sailed on Galway, last week, on a cruise.

On Thursday last, about one o'clock, Mr. Stewart, of the Revenue Police, quartered in this city, left his lodgings, taking with him a razor, and has not since been heard of. His mental faculties were not quite settled this time back, in consequence of a heavy fit of sickness under which he laboured. The general opinion is, that he is drowned himself; if so, he has left a wife and seven children to lament his untimely end.

Sunday night, some villains broke into the stable Shaon-park, the property of Mr. O'Farrell, and stole a quantity of ducks and turkeys. A similar robbery was committed a few nights before at Attysbin farm-yard, in this County.

The following is a statement of the number of prisoners admitted and discharged from the County Gaol, since the 3d of August last, being the Commission Day of last Assizes:—Admitted, 14; discharged, 254; in custody on Saturday, 134.
