16.—We are concerned to state, that on various parts of this county are the peace and safety of the inhabitants.—Three murders having been committed in the county Kilkenny since our departure. On Friday night, seven men broke into the house of James Nowlan, a farmer, at Talbot's Cross, Kilkenny, whom they beat to death in a dreadful manner, and robbed of bank notes to the amount of £40.

On Saturday night, a savage murder was committed in the barony of Galmoy, and near the residence of Mr. Drum, Esq. a number of whose cattle were killed. Four men, three of them carrying axes, and the fourth a hammer, but without entering the house of George Brophy, who was sitting at that place, whom they knocked down with a hammer, and, when down, fired a shot which closed his existence.—They next entered the unfortunate man's house, burned his tythe barn, and then dispersed.

On Sunday night, about seven o'clock, the house of Mr. O'Connell, a respectable farmer, who resides in the barony of Kilnamoinea, was entered by a banditti consisting of about a dozen men, in search of fire arms.

ATTEMPT AT ASSASSINATION.—On Sunday afternoon, as Alexander Hoskins, Esq. of the Castle of Newcastle, Co. Limerick, Agent to Lord Courtenay's Estate, was walking in his own grounds, he observed a man at a short distance, in a shrubbery, who presented a blunderbuss at him, which missed fire—the assassin, very deliberately, shook the powder in the pan, and snapped a second time, with a like result; and then, throwing the blunderbuss down, drew from his bosom a large pistol, which he cocked and fired at Mr. Hoskins—most fortunately, the ball only grazed his shoulder. The villain, finding that his shot had not the desired effect, ran off. We understand that several persons are implicated in this attempt at assassination, and that some have been arrested on suspicion.

Michael Ryan, who was shot by the Policeman, in the street, on Sunday se'night, died in the County Hospital yesterday, after his leg had been amputated, which produced a lock-jaw. The Mayor held an Inquest on the body. Verdict—"Died in consequence of a gun-shot wound, received by him, on Sunday, the 10th instant, from one of a party of Police."

The poor woman, injured by the fall of the house in Clare-street, (as stated in our last,) is likely to recover, under the assiduous attention of Surgeon Franklin.

On Monday evening, Samuel Prince, ginger-bread baker, of Kilkenny, returning from the fair of Ballinacorney, was robbed and murdered near the fair place of that city.

Michael Morony, of Glandree, County Clare, was waylaid on his return from the fair of Tulla, on the 9th inst and was so desperately beaten, that he expired on Saturday last; he had a large cut on his head, which appeared to have been inflicted by a hurley or some obtuse weapon.—An inquest was held on the body.

On Friday last, a man fell out of a canal boat, between the locks, near Killaloe, and perished before assistance could be rendered him.

On Sunday evening, James Smyth, a servant of Mr. Low's, of Quinpool, found four bags, which contained a number of dead geese, concealed in a field near that place—he very properly let them remain, and with a few persons, watched at a distance till the thieves returned at night for their hidden prey, when his party seized on three of them. They are notorious characters, and confessed having stolen the geese from the neighbourhood of Trugh, Co. Clare. One of the party has stated the names of his accomplices—Cornelius Nermoyie, Thomas Hayes, John Murphy, Walter Hurley, and Margaret M'Namare.
