John Roughan, who was so inhumanly cut with  
 a hatchet in Denmark-street, on the night of the  
 15th of January, by a party of combinators,  
 (as stated in our last,) died on Saturday night in  
 the greatest agony, at his father's house, in  
 Brunswick-street. On Sunday morning an Inquest  
 was held by Alderman Watson (*Chairman tenens*  
 for the Mayor.) and Alderman Omsby, and after  
 a long and satisfactory investigation, the following  
 verdict was returned:—"We find that the said  
 John Roughan came to his death on the 20th day  
 of January, inst. at Brunswick-street, in the City  
 of Limerick, by means of a mortal wound given  
 to him with an hatchet on the left side of his head  
 and skull, by John Crowley, of said City, tailor,  
 and other persons to us unknown, on the night of
