Editor of the Limerick Chronicle.
I have the pleasure to inform you that the
statements relative to the funds for Education in
Ireland, which appear in your Paper of the 10th inst. are
correct. Mr. M. Fitz-Gerald is there repre-
sented as stating that there are in Ireland Twenty Diocesan
Schools, which pay a large revenue. Now, Sir, the fact is, that
the income of a Diocesan Schoolmaster amounts to
£100 per annum, and this is a small sum, there being no
other stipend attached to the office.

Mr. Fitz-Gerald is also represented as
stating that there are four Classical Schools under the name
of Erasmus Smith, with funds amounting to
£100,000 per annum, the Masters of those Schools have salaries
of £100 each; and were we to take into account the
salaries of their ushers, of whom I think there are seven—
and some at £80, the whole expenditure upon
these schools would not amount to £800 per annum.

As to the Schools of Royal foundation, the highest salary
attached to any of them amounts only to £500 per annum. That of
the King's School, at Armagh, is but £400; and surely if there
were any other means to prevent the emigration to English Schools,
nothing can so strongly tend to alie-
nate the affections of Irishmen from their country, some in-
centives must be held out to men of superior qualifications
to undertake the laborious and most unpleasant task of
teaching in these schools.

I do not trespass further upon your indulgence, except
to say that the Reports of the Commissioners of Education
under the Act of 1806, to which Mr. Fitz-Gerald
has alluded, have afforded him almost the whole of the
information which he has here given, had he taken the trouble to
consult them.

knew that they honoured his exalted mind, his unsullied

his vigilance to the whispers of domestic affection; his
uniform obedience to the requisitions of friendship; and all
his manifold fine qualities, which, unhappily, now no longer
