There was no action brought by Alexander M'Donnell, proprietor of the *Limerick Gazette*, to recover £325 13s. 2d. out of his bill for advertisements, &c. during the political career of Mr. Tutbill, and while he was in connexion with the committee of Independents of the City of Limerick.—In defence was a Plea of Abatement, Mr. Tutbill being ordered to discharge his proportion as an individual of that committee. After a very long examination into various points, and appropriate observations by the Counsel on either side, the Court was of opinion, that the Defendant was liable for his share, and let the case go to the Jury with an impression, who found a verdict for the Plaintiff, £18, out of his private account, included in the demand.—As a private adjustment takes place between the parties concerned in the transaction, the matter will occupy the attention of the Gentlemen of the Long Robe.
