The second Session of the sixteenth Congress  
closed on the 3d of March. Among the Acts  
passed were the following:—

An Act to amend the Act for the gradual  
increase of the Navy of the United States—  
appropriated sum reduced from one million to an  
half.

An Act to reduce and fix the Military Peace  
Establishment—sum agreed upon, 200,000 dollars.

An Act to release French ships and vessels  
entering the ports of the United States, prior to  
the 30th of September, 1820, from the operation  
of the new tonnage duty.

An Act to cause astronomical observations to  
be made to ascertain the longitude of the Capitol  
in the City of Washington from some known  
meridian in Europe.

An Act to take a fourth census or enumeration  
of the inhabitants of the United States.

An Act to extend the time for unloading vessels  
arriving from foreign ports, in certain cases.

An Act to continue in force the Act regulating  
the currency of the gold coins of Great Britain,  
France, Portugal, and Spain.

An Act for carrying into execution the treaty  
between the United States and Spain, concluded  
at Washington on the 22d of February, 1819, for  
the occupation of the Floridas. The territorial

...appointments, and the appointment of Commis-  
sioners under the Spanish treaty, may be made by  
the President of the United States, in the recess of  
Congress.

The Bill to establish an uniform system of  
Bankruptcy, did not pass.

A loan of five millions of dollars was obliged to  
be resorted to in the last Session, to pay the current  
expenses of the Government.

The admission of Missouri as a State into the  
Union is not yet completed. The Members  
chosen as Representatives to Congress, have not

Washington during the Session, but a compensa-  
tion of 6,000 dollars has been voted to them.

The American Members of Congress receive  
eight dollars per day during their attendance at  
the Session.
