DEATHS.

On Monday, in London, at the advanced age of ninety-one,
the Most Noble the Marquis of Drogheda. From his
Noble Father, who died in 1754, he inherited the titles of
Earl of Drogheda, Viscount Moore, Baron Mellefont, in
Ireland ; and was himself created a Marquis of Ireland in
1799, and a Baron of Great Britain in 1801. He was also
a Knight of the Order of St. Patrick. His Lordship
married, in 1766, Lady Ann, daughter of the first Marquis
of Hertford, by whom he had several children. He is
succeeded in his titles by his son Charles Viscount Moore,
now Marquis of Drogheda. The late Marquis of Drogheda
was the oldest General in the service, and Colonel of the
18th Dragoons, to which he was appointed in 1759. His
Lordship was Constable of Marshborough Fort, Governor
and Custos Rotulorum of the King's and Queen's Counties
and of the County of Meath.
