This day the 49th Regiment were to arrive in
Waterford, and to-morrow the 2d Veteran
Battalion are to embark at that port for Ports-
mouth, and the 3d Veteran Battalion for Ply-
mouth, both to be disbanded on the 21th of
June.

Captain Bartley's company of the 49th Regi-
ment have arrived at Carlow, to do duty.

The 1th Royal Veteran Battalion are to be
disbanded at Ayn on the 27th inst.

Detachments of the 3d Veteran Battalion,
from Tarbert, Carrick-Island, and Scattery,
arrived here on Monday, and yesterday pro-
ceeded for Waterford.

The 88th Connaught Rangers expect shortly
to leave Chester, for Ireland.

The 2d Dragoon Guards, stationed at New-
bridge, near Nayan, have received orders to hold
themselves in readiness for immediate embarkation
for Liverpool, on the arrival of the 10th
Lancers, who are expected in Dublin this
day.

On Saturday, a soldier's wife and child of
the 40th regt. on their way to this City, fell
from a baggage car, on the road near Bunratty;
the child was killed on the spot, and the mother
much bruised.

Yesterday evening, a woman of the name of
Dempsey, apparently in good health, whilst walk-
ing in the street of Rathkeale, fell down and
instantly expired.

Last night, the Dairy-House of George
Gloster, Esq. on the Linds of Coolyhenan, was
attacked by a number of men, armed, who
destroyed all the Furniture contained therein,
together with the milk and vessels, and beat
the occupier in a very cruel manner. The former
dairyman had been lately removed from the
concern. Some of Mr. Gloster's tenants' houses
convenient, were attacked by the same party
and the owners ill-treated.

The Herdsman's house was also attacked and
attempted to be burned.

On Monday evening, a Gentleman from Tar-
bert brought up three pieces of Linen to be
bleached, which were left at Mr. O'Brien's,
Grocer, in George's-street, in a few minutes
after a villain went to the shop, and by false
tokens received the Linen, and escaped there-
with.

In our last publication we merely noticed the

Rev. Doctor Tuohy, Roman Catholic Bishop of
his Diocese. The election of this distinguished

reduced. To leave the Parish in a state of total
destitution at this time, is not altogether prudent,
especially when connecting that circumstance with a
reduction of the strength of the Main Guard, in
the Town, presents a very gloomy prospect
to the Inhabitants.
