UNPRECEDENTED MURDER

In a short time after that attack Mr. Torrance left Comigar, having taken the farm of Monatella Hill from the Hon. W. Quin, which is situated within a mile of Adare, in the County Limerick. On this form he was making some improvements, but did not reside there, having taken judging. The claim of Mr. Soames, to be allowed to in the village while these were going on, and returned each evening by a short cut or pathway through the fields.

On Sanday, Mr. Torrance and his wife dined of the farm, and on returning to Adare, a little after eight o'clock, were met at a stone gap (which divided the path-way from the end of a narrow bye-mad.) by two men dressed in tight frize costs; one of these fellows handed a letter to Mr. Torrance, and while he was in the act gave him a blow of a large stone in the back of

At that moment, Mrs. Torrance, who was leaning on the left arm of her hasband, shricked, and cought hold of the assessin; he struggled with her some time, and both fell; and while she by on the ground, he indicted two mortal wounds with a sharp instrument-one, about two inches above, and the other about the like distance under the left breast, which passed caused almost instant death.

While this scene of borbarity was proceeding, the other assessia was contending with Mr. Torrance to effect a like purpose; and they mem to have had a desperate conflict. From them as dead, appears to be about 100 yards all that distance he fought with the fellow, still retiring into the hollow of the field, and during which he gave him several blows in the face and legs, with an ash stick, which he wrested from the assassin's hands in the first instance, but, unfortunately, in making a desperate blow ut his legs, in order to disable him totally, the stick was broken in two, and he became marmed At that moment, Mr. Torrance was knocked down by the second ruffian ; and, while on the ground, a wound of about six inches deep was and then retired across the flat grounds toward the Shannon.

When Mr. Torrance found they had gone off, though greatly fatigued in the conflict, and weakened by loss of blood, he scrambled on his surrounding the body of his wife, he lifted her in his arms, and placed her in a corn-field which was divided from the mireferous scene by a loose stone wall of about three feet high there he left her, and endeavoured to make his way towards Adare. On reaching the high road, (which is about three hundred yards from the spot where the murder was committed,) he got into the house of John Switzer, where, after relating the circumstance, he fainted, and continued so for some time.

Switzer having prorured assistance, went to the place where Mrs. Torrance's body lay, and had it conveyed to the house of William Eston. in Adare.

Mr. Torrance was also removed with care to his lodgings in the house of Mr. John Reynard, where he had the instant attendance of Doctor

A messenger was instantly dispatched to Limerick for Dr. Thwaites, who arrived at an early hour next morning, and dressed his wounds (thirteen in number, besides bruises) : and we are rejoiced to learn from Mr Thwaites's report last night, that he is as well as can be expected. and has hopes of his recovery.

When the account reached town on Monday morning, nothing could exceed the horror and dismay apparent in every countenance. Numbers of respectable citizens immediately proceeded to Atlare to ascertain the trath, and learn all the particulars of this horrid scene-indeed, there were many inclined not to believe that such barbarity could have taken place, but, unfor-

tunately, they were soon convinced. Mr. Going, Police Magistrate, attended at the bed-side of Mr. Torrance, about ten o'clock on Monday morning, and took his informations, which embrace some of the above particulars. In describing the fellows, he states them to be stout, strong men, (one particularly so,) both about five feet seven inches high, and appeared

An Inquest was held at twelve o'clock on the body of Mrs. Torrance, by John Cox, Esq. Coroner. The evidence before them was that of the finding of the body by John Dee and Tobias Switzer; the reading of Mr. T.'s information, by Mr. Going; and the testimony of Dr. A Mail will in future leave Dublin for Cork | Thwaites as to the cause of her death. This circumstance, however, we have been told did not occur, as Mr. T. was asked the question and denied it.

On searching the field, the scabbard of a carbine beyonet was found, together with what is called a quarter-ash wattle.

Mrs. Torrance's clothes were considerable torn, and some of them distributed great distunces from each other, which shows that she must have had a long struggle with the assassin, before he accomplished her destruction. Mr. Torrunce is of opinion that she knew the fellow, and gave him reason to think so from some expressions, which induced him not to quit her till her death was effected. His clothes were also turn to pieces; the coat and waistcoat were literally in strips.

At the time the murder was committing, some persons on horseback were approaching the Impike, two of whom had passed through, and ...ing out to the Pike-man to shut the gate in order to create some amusement, (it is believed casually and without any other motive) caneed a great noise, which unfortunately had the effect of drowning the shricks of Mrs. Torrance, which otherwise must have been heard there, as the distance acro's the fields cannot be more than about two andred yards.

The shutters of all the principal shops in this City were closed during the entire of Monday, as a mark of respect towards Mrs. Terrance; ad her remains were brought into town at an early hour yesterday moraing and interred in the Family Vault, at St. Munchin's Church, attended by many respectable persons. There was a general feeling of regret that a sufficient notice had not been given of the time of interment, in order that every person should have me opportunity of accompanying the remains (and particularly under such lamentable circumstances) of so deeply-regretted a lady. She was the daughter of the late Benjamin

We cannot close without lamenting the stain this act has inflicted on the national character; that a Gentleman, felr and opright in his dealings, mild and concillatory in his manners, said, " Come away, Tom, we have done enough," and a public benefactor to the working classes of his neighbourhood, should have been marked as the victim of a relentless hostility, and why? -- because he would not surrender his arms to a lawless banditti-because he had spirit and firmness not to be accessary to their nightly misdoings .- That Mrs. Torrance should equally share in their resentment is also a subject of melancholy reflection-her heart and her home accessible to the wants and affictions of the poor - her closet their dispensery.

The following further particulars were sent us, and they differ in some points from the above statement :

When Mr. and Mrs. T. approached the stone gap, only one of the men came over the wall and handed Mr. T. a letter, upon looking at which he heard his wife scream, and turning about received a blow of a stone in the face, which stunned him, but did not knock him down ; be then attacked the ruffien, who, finding himself likely to be worsted, criled to his compenion to come to his assistance, who immediately lesped over the wall, armed with a quarter-ash stick, and separated Mrs. Torrance from her husband. In the scuffle she wrested the stick from the murderer's hand and threw it to Mr. Torrance, who maintained a long conflict, until the stick breaking disarmed him, and he was then so much wounded by bayonets and stones that he lay for dead, as did also his wife after receiving her mortal wounds; when one fellow called to the othersaying, "Tom, comeaway there is enough." Perceiving that they had gone over the wall, Mrs. T. got up and ran over to her hasband asking him if he was killed; he said I am not, but I am afraid you are ; no said she, but I am very faint, and leaned upon his arm, until they got to the wall, where she sunk down, never to rise again. He then lifted her on the wall and got her into a corn field at the opposite side, and went to Switzer's house for assistance.

Mrs. Torrance received four wounds, two in the chest and two in the head; those in the hend were firsh wounds, but both of the orners which were inflicted with a bayonet, penetrated the chest, the upper one went thro' her left breast between the ribs, penetrating the lungs and heart, of which she died in a few minutes. Mr. Torrance received thirteen wounds with & bayonet, and one with a flat instrument, like a knife; one of the bayonet wounds penetrated his left side, running under the ribe shout six inches, and wounding the lungs.
