Mr. Torrance continues to improve—his fever having subsided, and every hope entertained of his recovery.

The persons mentioned in our list, as having been apprehended near Adare, still remain in custody in the Bridewell of that Village.—There are others arrested by the City Magistrates, and are still in custody for further examination.

We this day publish a list of the Rewards offered for the murderers of Mrs. Torrance; and, from the exertions pursuing, we are in hopes they will not long elude justice.

A man named Molony, answering the description given by Mr. Torrance, as one of the villains who attacked him, has fled from his abode, near Mungret. Intimation of this has been forwarded to all the Police Magistrates in Ireland, and to the outports.

Molony is step-brother of Finnesne, who, it is well ascertained, was killed in the burglary on Mr. Torrance's house at Cuunigar.

A Requisition is in progress to the County High Sheriff to convene his Bailiwick, in order to express its detestation of this most horrid and shocking outrage, and to appoint a Committee for receiving and appropriating a portion of the Rewards subscribed, for private information. The Proclamation from Government, offering a Reward, will be to a large amount, and is daily expected.

On Wednesday night, upwards of two hundred armed men entered the town of Rathkeale, preceded by a number of horses with cars, and immediately commenced breaking open the Excise Revenue Stores, which contained a quantity of illicit spirits and other articles of seizures: this work they accomplished in a very short time, and then deliberately proceeded to load the cars with stills, heads, worms, pans, and vessels of all sorts, all of which they carried off without meeting opposition. A person in a neighbouring house happening to raise a window, was pelted with stones, and all the glass in front of the house smashed. They placed sentinels in different avenues previous to the commencement of the work.

Monday night the house of Doctor Portarlington, was robbed of several articles; a hue and cry having been raised, the perpetrators were apprehended in the Nans by Mr. Harrison, coroner, and brought to jail; some of their booty is also recovered.

At his father's house, in Mourne, on the 25th of May last, as John Loftus H. a line boy, four and a-half years old, Captain John Hopkins, of the Revenue was running from the yard into the kitchen, reaching the table, he turned round, and fell backwards into a pot of scalding water which had been recently taken off the fire and placed under the table for safety. This young child was so much scalded, that he died but forty-eight hours after the accident.

The Rev. John Isaac Beresford, eldest son of the Rev. Charles Cobbe Beresford, Termon Glebe, Co. Tyrose, has been elected by the Bishops of Kilmore and Ossory, Parishes of Killineear, in the County of Wick, and Mayne, in the County of Kilkenny.

The Royal Assent is given, transferring the Representation of two Members of Parliament from Grampond to the County of York, so that now will have four Representatives.

Admiral Sir Josias Rowley, is a candidate for the Representation of Kinsale, in the County of Cork, in the room of Captain Coussmaker, deceased.

On the 8th of August an Election will take place at Hollyrood-House, Edinburgh, for a Scotch Representative Peer, in room of Lord Stair, deceased.

It is stated, that Sir William W. Wynne, Forrester, and Sir James Saumaurez, were created Peers on the Coronation day.

Doctor Lyons was on Thursday last elected Physician to the Foundling Hospital, City, for the ensuing year.

Mr. Joseph Kenny, of Cloanmel, is appointed an Attorney of the Court of Exchequer.

Mr. Clarke has moved his Theatrical Company to Carlow—Miss Byrne will appear there on the 25th inst.

On Tuesday next, the two beautiful planets Jupiter and Saturn, will be in apparent conjunction, their distance being only two degrees, and will present to the contemplative eye a most majestic display; their appearance on the 21, of Aries, they will rise about one o'clock p. m. and in the evening, in the West, they will be observed approaching towards the horizon. About the beginning of August, they will be stationary, and, from that time until the end of December, present an interesting appearance, moving in a retrograde direction. At the middle of November they will again be in conjunction, after which, this phenomenon will not again occur for many years.
