The Archbishop of Tuam has arrived in Dublin.

The Archbishop of Cashel is indisposed. We are rejoiced to state that Thomas Lloyd, Esq. Assistant Barrister for this County, arrived at his seat, Beechmount, on Sunday, considerably improved in health.

It gives us much pleasure to see a meeting advertised for the formation of a Society in Limerick, in aid of the Funds of the London Hibernian Society. We understand that this is an Institution which has strong claims on Ireland, having expended large sums collected in Britain for the Education of the Poor of this Country; and that its plans are liberal, economical, and efficient. The demands for new Schools are greater than their funds are able to support, we therefore trust that our good City will not be behind other towns, in liberally contributing to this great national undertaking. As a proof of the plan being suited to the state of Ireland, we give an extract from a work by a Roman Catholic Barrister, on the education of the Peasantry of this Country. After he has examined the merits of the different Societies in Ireland for the Education of the Poor, he says, "The London Hibernian Society has been fortunate in the adoption of a plan more suitable than any that has yet been tried to the circumstances of Ireland--they do not interfere with the religious profession of the people--the plan of teaching adopted by the Society is excellent, and their system of constant inspection and superintendance of their Schools insure their usefulness." We expect the information to be communicated to this Meeting by Robert Steven, Esq. of London, a Member of the London Hibernian School Society, will be very interesting.

He lingered in great agony for some time, and died on Saturday night. He has left a wife and six children. An inquest was held on Sunday, by the Rev. Richard Cox, Major Wilson, and Mr. Maunsell, and after an investigation of seven hours, a verdict of wilful murder against persons unknown was returned.
