

His Royal Highness orders me to inform that the Officers whose application received in the interval, between this period of reduction, will be included or of those to be reduced on this whether they be or be not the juniors in their respective ranks.

It is obvious to you, that the object of His Royal Highness is given to the optional execution of the same, as it regards the individuals affected by it, is to preserve to those of their profession those who are most anxious to continue in the discharge of them, and who shall prove themselves as Regimental Officers.

It is further facility towards this object, to view also to open the means of advancement to many Officers whose object is the attainment of a step of regimental rank, although the result will be half-pay, it has been ascertained that upon this occasion, and in consequence, there shall be some relaxation which limits the privilege of selling Commissions, as not purchased to those who have served a service of twenty years, and His Royal Highness orders me to acquaint you, that those who have served sixteen years, and those who have served twelve years, the option of selling their Commissions, may be or be not included in the choice of their successors.

It is however, to be clearly understood, that the additional facilities offered to the sale of Commissions, shall cease to have effect as soon as the action now ordered shall have taken effect, so that the old rule shall be again in force.
