ublic civil officers whose salaries (after or revision upon the foregoing principle) do not exceed £100 per annum, and hereafter become entitled to superannuation, are required to contribute one-tenth of such salaries &c. to this new superannuation fund—such per cent to be paid by the respective officers into the "old debt office" within seven days after payment of their salaries. All vacancies in appointments, &c. are to be filled up, after the fifth of January according to the stations.
