

that all offices shall be restored, as to the persons employed, and their several to the state in which they were placed in 1797, subject, however, to such variations as the peculiarity of circumstances may render expedient.

That all offices, after undergoing such a new establishment to commence on the 5th of January next.

Further in contemplation to repeal the act III. c. 117, which regulates the pension allowances to retired civil officers, in order to the payment thereof out of the funds, and in lieu of such to compel all persons who may hereafter become entitled to contribute a fixed rate per annum upon their respective salaries and emoluments towards the formation of a superannuation fund, to be administered under the direction of the Treasury, and to be established in the following manner.

Public civil officers whose salaries (after an or revision upon the foregoing principle) to, or exceed, £100 per annum, and who hereafter become entitled to superannuation, are required to contribute a cent. of such salaries &c. to this new superannuation fund—such per cent. to be paid by the respective officers into the public debt office, within seven days after the date of their salaries. All vacancies in such offices, &c. are to be filled up, of after the fifth of January according to the regulations.

It is necessary to observe, with reference to those officers whose situations are to be altered, and whose salaries exceed those allowed by the new and reduced scales shall continue to enjoy their present salaries, &c. but not being permitted to obtain the usual progression to which they would otherwise be entitled, until they become entitled to the new and reduced scale to salaries, with such progressive advance, would those they now possess.

Indulgence, however, is not to be unqualifiedly intended, that all officers so circumstanced, and whose emoluments exceed £100 hereafter to be attached to their particular offices shall be required to make an additional contribution according to the following scale:—

Additional 2½ per cent. upon all salaries (not exceeding £100 and not exceeding 500; and on do. not exceeding £1000; and on all salaries, &c. exceeding 1000; the whole a per centage of 7½ on the first 500; 10 in the second, and 15 per cent. on the third class.

Additional contribution is not, however, required, unless the excess of salary above the new scale be hereafter allowed, shall be double the amount of the further contribution thus required; and to cease whenever such salaries shall be reduced by progressive advance, assimilated to the new and reduced scale of payments.

Further intended that all Officers who are permitted to retire upon the superannuation allowance, shall receive one-half of such allowance out of the new fund to be created by the public as at present.

Also in contemplation to establish a scale, new, for the regulation of the superannuation allowance, and which new scale will be as advantageous to the retired Officers as now existing.

NOTICE is hereby given, that, by the 55th Geo. III. chap. 100, "if any person in Ireland shall have, keep, or use, any Greyhound, Hound, Pointer, Setting Dog, Spaniel, Lurcher, or other Dog; or any Gun, Net, or other engine, for the taking or destruction of any Game whatsoever, without having a Certificate for the same, or a Certificate of having registered a deputation, whereby such person is appointed Game-keeper according to Law—every such person shall, for every such offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Twenty Pounds British."

The several Distributors of Stamps throughout Ireland are supplied with Game Certificates, &c. for their respective Districts. And Mr. Brown, Inspector of Stamp Duties for Munster, has particular instructions to prosecute all such Persons as shall presume to keep or use Dogs or Guns, without having obtained a Certificate as is required by Law for that purpose. By the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland, A PROCLAMATION.

TALBOT, WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Fortieth Year of his late Majesty's Reign, entitled "An Act to oblige Ships more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and prevent the Plague and other infectious Diseases from being brought into Ireland, and to hinder the spreading of the same," it is amongst other things enacted, that all Vessels arriving, and all Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes whatsoever, coming or imported into any place within Ireland, from any place whence the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, and with the advice of the Privy Council, shall judge it probable that any Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine in such Place and Places, for such time and in such manner as hath been or shall from Time to Time be directed by the Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being by his or their Order or Orders made by the advice of the Privy Council, and notified by Proclamation.

And Whereas, information hath been received, that a Fever of a malignant nature hath manifested itself in Baltimore, in the United States of America; and it is judged probable that the said infectious disease may be brought into Ireland, by ships or vessels coming from, or having touched at the said place.

Now we the Lord Lieutenant and Council, in pursuance of the said Act, do therefore order and direct that all Vessels, Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, coming from or having touched at Baltimore, shall, on their arrival in Ireland, be placed under Quarantine, and not discharged therefrom without an order of this Board.

And the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs are to give the necessary orders herein, as to them may respectively appertain.
