BARBAROUS OUTRAGES IN THE COUNTY OF LIMERICK.

Sunday last, Dennis Buckley, Cornelius Crowley, and two women, who were crown witnesses at the last County Assizes, returning home from this City, were attacked at Ardagh, and beat so unmercifully, that Buckley died on the following morning. Crowley and the women escaped to Newcastle, where they were also maltreated, and it is stated, that little hopes are entertained of their recovery. As a means of ensuring Buckley's safe return to his home, he was sent a circuitous route by water, and landed at Foynes-Island, but such was the determination of the ruffians who projected his destruction, that no pass he could go by was left without observation.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.

We understand, only one of the persons who were attacked at Ardagh on Sunday last, on their return through that town to Newcastle, died---but another of them is so severely wounded that his life is despaired of. So determined were the ruffians on their destruction, that they rushed out of Ardagh Chapel where they were at their devotion, and surrounding their victims, left them for dead, and threw them into a ditch full of water. The women who were of the party fled, but on their arrival at Newcastle, many inhabitants threw boiling water on them thro' the windows, and a large mob immediately collected and threw volleys of stones at them, which wounded two so severely as to render their recovery doubtful---a third was stripped and dragged through the river and beat unmercifully. The Police, although present, were unable to take any of the offenders into custody.

On Monday last, as the Mail Car was passing through Rathkeale, Bernard McClosky, a witness, returning from the Assizes to Newcastle, was forcibly dragged from it by a number of men from the town, and beat and mangled so severely, that his life is considered by the Surgeon in great danger.

Neither the Military or Police interfered, to take the offenders into custody, and had it not been for the humanity of Lieut. Doolan, who took him under his protection, the poor man would have been inevitably destroyed.

When prosecutors and witnesses for the Crown are so treated with impunity, no hope can be entertained that criminals will be brought to justice.

A gentleman passing through the Patrick's-Well, in this County, on afternoon, was surprised to see a large of peasantry marching in military preceded by music, and several decorated ribbons, and upwards of 60 of them armed with large swords; he was told they were to a club dinner; but why our neighbouring Magistrates should permit meetings of this nature, as they terminate very badly.

The Hon. Baron Pennefather, at the conclusion of the County Assizes on Saturday, Magistrate One Hundred Pounds, committed persons, and omitted sending Crown-Officer their informations. He observed, that on the last day of the County Assizes there were sixty persons in the dock for trial, owing to this neglect, which she passed over without particular notice. The Learned Baron, however, should not inflict the penalty, but would advise the Magistrates until the next Assizes to observe their conduct. A Magistrate who neglects an individual for any crime, and neglects to bring him to trial, does not discharge his duty, because, if guilty, let the culprit be punished, if innocent, why deprive him of his liberty? Committing persons on suspicion, and keeping them in prison is an illegal act. There are many cases where a Magistrate is justified in committing persons on strong suspicion, but then, his judgment should direct them in such cases. All fines on absent County Justices ordered to be taken off by Baron Pennefather on Saturday evening.

The Grand Jury of the County of Limerick have granted the sum of £15 to Thomas Vokes, Esq. compensation for the loss of his horses as mentioned in the Limerick Chronicle; said sum to be levied on the County of Newcastle where the outrage was committed.

Michael Shaughnessy for burning the Newcastle is to be hanged on Wednesday the 3d October. No day is fixed for the execution of Joseph Quin, late Postmaster of Garry, whose conviction was stated in our first page.

Sunday last, the City Sheriff issued an order from Government, directing the Sheriff of Dwyer and Hefferuan, for the County of Limerick, to be respited until further orders.
