An advertisement having appeared in the Limerick Chronicle, of Saturday last, from the Castle Office calling on the Courtenay Tenantry for payment of their rents up to the 29th September 1820—As this is evidently intended to prejudice the public mind against this much vilified tenantry; by proclaiming the seeming indigence and forbearance exercised upon that Estate in the collection of the rents, and the great arrear allowed to remain outstanding, it is but justice to state that this property fell out of lease between the years 1810 and 1813—and was then re-leased at the enormous war rents of that period, and had the abatements granted upon those rents in the peace, been continued for the last three years, this tenantry would now be found as free from arrear as any other in the Kingdom.
