Monday night, some wretches robbed St. Mary's Chapel, of a quantity of Linen, Cloth and Choir. Friday last, two poor girls, aged 22 and 16 years, picking sea-weed on the rocks at Bally-drowned. On Monday, John Connors was convicted under the Mutiny Act, before Alderman Watson, for having supplied two soldiers, who deserted from the 79th Regiment, with coats in exchange for their uniforms. The Act is imperative, on conviction, for the payment of £5, or in default thereof, the offender to be publicly or privately whipped, or committed to gaol for three months, which latter sentence was pronounced against Connors. There will be a sporting Doe enlarged at Rathmore Castle, on Saturday, at eleven o'clock. The Mary, Lewis, from Malaga, which arrived in this river on Sunday, is placed under Quarantine. The Waterloo, Monro, from Gibraltar, arrived in this river on Saturday, and is also performing Quarantine. The brig Industry, of Whitehaven, from Liverpool to this port, was wrecked near Aughris, Co. Sligo, on the 5th inst.; three of the crew, named Andrew Gilbert, John Madgin and James Ralston, were saved through the exertions of Counsellor Hillas and his Sons, who perceived the wreck from his house at Seaview; the remainder of the crew consisting of Captain Gregg, his wife, the mate, and six seamen, met a watery grave. The Steward of the House of Industry has received fifty stone of potatoes for the poor, now amounting to 360, in that asylum. Two young Ladies, Miss Winter and Miss Moriarty, have handed five shillings to Alderman Watson, for the poor family at Ballyseeda, being part of the produce of a small Lottery.

About the hour of four o'clock on the morning of Monday, the 5th inst. an armed banditti surrounded the house of William Purcell, Esq. of Altamira, within six miles of Charleville, in the County Cork, and at the same moment, both with shots and stones, broke the entire of the windows in the four fronts of the house; they then attempted to force the front and back doors, which, no doubt, they would have succeeded in accomplishing, had it not been for the providential precaution adopted only the evening before by Mr. P. namely, that of placing large rocks on the attic windows that commanded the doors, which were occasionally thrown down with the best effect. This judicious arrangement caused an instantaneous retreat of the marauders from the doors, which was immediately taken advantage of by Mr. P. who fired on them at the hazard of his life, being obliged, from the darkness of the morning, to expose himself a great deal at the windows. From the quantity of blood found about the house, and the taking into consideration Mr. P.'s arms being loaded with swan-drops, many of the assailants must have been wounded. It will be necessary to state, that Mr. Purcell's activity, as a Magistrate, which has been so much experienced in that part of the country, has pointed him out as a fit object of hatred to these villains; but, it is to be hoped, that those whose province it is will not be dilatory in affording that support and protection, which is so justly called for and deservedly merited by this active and gallant Magistrate. We trust that the same spirited and determined resolution will be pursued by the Gentlemen in that part of the country, who may be unfortunately placed in the same predicament, which is, at the present moment, so necessary for the safety of the country. On Sunday night, the house of Mr. James Hill, at Graigue, was attacked, and some fire-arms taken. Mr. Leahy's house, at Suppleton, was likewise attacked, and two guns obtained. Several Gentlemen in this County have detachments of Police and Military stationed in their houses, to resist the expected visits from the nightly marauders. On Sunday night, a picket of the 33d Regiment, in patrolling the roads in the neighbourhood of Buttevant, fell in with a body of men whom they dispersed, but succeeded in taking six of them prisoners. They were brought to the barracks of that town, and underwent an examination on Monday, before the Magistrates.
