The following circumstance has been communicated to us by a respectable Correspondent: "During the last week, as the 22d Regiment were on their march thro' Mitchelstown, they were billeted on the several Public-houses. On their arrival in Mallow, two of them went before a Magistrate, and swore that the night they stopped in Mitchelstown, they saw from the room they slept in through an opening in the wainscot, the man of the house inspecting arms of every description, the servant maid holding the candle for him, and that there were at least 30 stand of arms, double-barrelled guns and pikes in the room. The Magistrate, Mr. Dillon, immediately set off in a chaise to Mitchelstown, accompanied by the two men, and an escort of Dragoons, but after most diligent search in the house and garden, where the men had sworn to have seen the arms, nothing of the kind could be found. The man and woman, however, were committed to Bridewell, but from the man's character, no person in the town gives the smallest credit to it."

The statement in the Kilkenny Paper, that a Proctor of the Rev. Mr. Langrishe's, in the County Clare, was lately murdered, is incorrect. A Meeting of the County Tipperary Magistrates is to be held this day, in Nenagh, connected by Circular Letters, from Lord Dunally, to take into consideration the state of the County, and to adopt necessary measures for the preservation of tranquillity.

The entire of the 33d Regiment are now quartered in Cork.

The 9th Regiment have moved to the County head-quarters Tralee.

The 3d Fusiliers are ordered back to London.
