Sir—I shall thank you to contradict the report
of the post-boy and dragoons being attacked
near Ballyhoura Mountain. The boy and one
dragoon that came up from Charleville gave a
very improper account; nothing of the kind
having occurred, or any shots being fired, except
by themselves, through wantonness. On the
report reaching this, a large party of the military
immediately scoured the country, with Lord
Doneraile, a Magistrate, and of course returned
without any prisoners, having ascertained that
nothing of the kind had taken place.

The following Resolutions were unanimously agreed to:
Resolved—That we deeply regret the unhappy state of
some neighbouring Counties, and are not only determined to
keep ourselves free from such outrages as exist therein,
but will unite in repelling them to the utmost of our
power.
Resolved—That we are convinced, that the two instan-
ces of Outrage committed in our neighbourhood, namely,
the burning of Mr. Kison's house, and the taking of a
misguided persons from the adjacent County, consequently
no blame can be attached to the Penance of this County,
who from the commencement of the present troubles, have
manifested every mark of attachment to the King and
Constitution, and for a steady adherence to which, we will
yield to no body of men in the Realm.
Resolved—That while we give full credit to the prompt
and efficient measures of the Magistracy, we cannot with-
hold what is due to the good sense and feeling of the Majority
of the people, labouring as they are under manifold privations,
peculiarly aggravated by the effects of a season, un-
precedented for its inclemency; and that to these privations
more than to any political motive, as maliciously insinuated
in some public Prints, we ascribe the present distressed cir-
cumstances of the people, the remedy for which we shall not
take upon us to suggest, the application resting in a great
measure with the Landed interests.
Resolved—That we will give every aid in our power to
the Magistrates and Military, in enforcing an observance to
the Laws and preserving tranquility to the County, and that
we earnestly recommend the Penance to be wary of Strangers
and Seducers, who artfully contrive to elude punishment them-
selves while the victims of their seduction perish on the
scaffold as an atonement to the offended Laws of their
Country.
Resolved—That our warmest Thanks are due to the Rev.
Michael O'Sullivan for the zeal, ability, and perseverance
which he has manifested at all times.
