year of her age, Mary, wife of the Rev. Robert Morrison,
D. D. daughter of John Burton, Esq. formerly Surgeon-
General to the Royal Irish Artillery, and grand-daughter of
the Rev. Jacques Ingrams, late of this City. The circum-
stances attendant on Mrs. Morrison's demise, were of a
nature peculiarly distressing: the short space of fourteen
hours having only intervened between the commencement
and the termination of a fatal disease which bereaved her
attached husband of an affectionate wife, her children of an
exemplary mother, and her family of a relative eminently
distinguished for piety, intellect, and worth. Mrs. Morrison,
being a Christian, her remains were prevented from being
interred in the Chinese Sepulchre, but her memory was held
in such respect, that a Committee of the English Society
purchased a piece of ground for 400 dollars where she was
interred—her funeral was attended by Sirs W. Frazer and
Andrew Logstedt, and the respectability of Macao—and the
Sunday following every individual of the English Society
appeared in deep mourning.
