

Upon the circumstances... Morgan, he, with that commendable zeal and activity, which this Gentleman and family have so frequently evinced since the commencement of the disturbances in this County, repaired to Histon's house, accompanied by a party of the 42d, instantly ordered for the purpose by Major McLean, and succeeded in apprehending and lodging Histon in the Bridewell of Shanagolden, in a few hours after the occurrence.

A demand of fire-arms was made, by a small banditti, at Ballinvira, the seat of Thomas B. Fitzgerald, Esq. a few evenings since, but a loaded musket having been presented by one of the inmates, the party retreated without obtaining their object.

The house of Francis Walker, Esq. and several other dwellings at Lahern, within four miles of Tralee, were searched for fire-arms, on Thursday night; the fellows also visited Lieutenant Scanlan, R. N. near Kilfin, and made him promise to leave that part of the Country, otherwise they would burn his house, which is thatched.

Since the arrival of Sir N. C. Colthurst, at his seat, Ardrum, near Cork, a party of Military has been stationed there, at whose head he nightly visits the surrounding country.

A man, named Fitzgerald, apprehended near Emly, for collecting money in the name of Captain Rock, is lodged in Clonmel Jail.

Two men, employed by Lord Clarina to watch timber, were fired at and wounded by some ruffians, at Elm Park, on Sunday night.

The Magistrates in the vicinity of Macroom have applied to Government, praying that the Insurrection Act may be put in force in Ireland.

Within these few days past, the entire country West and North of Mallow has assumed a new appearance. On Saturday night a number of men well armed, attacked the house of a man named Sullivan at Scart, in the parish of Ballycough, and demanded his money, for the purpose, as they alledged, of seeing Lawyers and Attornies in defence of prisoners at the expected Commission. They placed the man of the house on his knees, with a blunderbuss to his face, and compelled him to acknowledge, and finally give up, what money he had in his possession. They then proceeded to the house of Mr. Robert Homan, of Fort Homan in said parish, and demanded money. Mr. Jones, brother to the Roman Catholic Curate of Mallow, happening to be in the house at the time, assured them that Mr. Homan was from home, which was the fact, and they then retired, but declared they should return in a few nights.

On Friday morning last, at 4 a. m. a body of men, consisting of between 500 and 700, well armed and mostly mounted, attacked the house of D. Mellefont, Esq. and also the houses of Messrs. Doyle and Paterson, Bantry, from all of which they took arms.

We have just heard, that Lord Bantry, accompanied by his brother, the Hon. Simon White, and two or three other Gentlemen, proceeding from his Lordship's seat on Friday, to Mr. Mellefont's, near Bantry, to afford that Gentleman assistance against a meditated attack on his house, encountered in the way, an advanced party of Insurgents, in number, five; they called on them to surrender, and on their preparing to resist, Captain White fired, and shot one of them, when the party retired, shouting, on the main body, whose advance obliged Lord B. and his friends to make a precipitate retreat to Seafield.

On Friday, a Meeting was held at Patrick's-Well, agreeable to advertisement, when the Gentlemen present resolved to enter into subscriptions at their ensuing Meeting, on Thursday next, should the pecuniary assistance of the non-resident Proprietors, and of those resident Gentlemen who did not attend, enable them to raise a fund for the purchase of fuel for the poor, which their Chairman, John Greene, Esq. has been directed earnestly to solicit. If this example, so worthy of imitation, was generally adopted, it would tend much to alleviate the sufferings of the poor at this very inclement season.

A Serjeant and twelve men, of the Ennis Bantry, proceeded for Crusheen on Monday. detachments of the 4th, 5th, 9th, 21st, and 35th Regiments, sailed from the Isle of Wight, on the 11th instant, on board the Highland Lad transpo for the West Indies.

It has been found that the sword now used by Officers of Infantry is of little or no use, it is intended to adopt the Light Infantry sabre throughout the Service.

An Order has been issued from the Horse Guards for the adoption of the keyed bugle in all Regiments of Infantry, instead of the common bugle now in use.

THE Commissioners of Customs in London having, by a General Order, issued by them, bearing date the 11th of December, 1821, stated that having had under consideration the present average Tares allowed on Sugars imported, and caused experiments to be made by their principal Surveyor at the West India Docks, in conjunction with a Committee of West India Merchants, with a view to ascertain the correctness of the existing Table of Average Tares established in 1805, and to make such alteration therein as might be considered just and equitable to the Crown and the Importers, and the following Table having been submitted as the result of these experiments, viz. —
