

LIMERICK, SATURDAY, JAN. 19.

A most barbarous and inhuman murder was committed on a man named Foley, on the night of Thursday last, on the lands of Movidly, near Newcastle, in this County, and the body afterwards thrown into the river. James Condon, Esq. of Kilscaannel, having got private information of the occurrence, immediately communicated with Major Wilcocks, through Lieut. Colonel Dick, of the 42d Highlander, who despatched Mr. Kiely, Chief Officer, with the Police, and succeeded in arresting the persons charged with the murder. The Rev. Mr. Fitzgerald, P. P. with his usual activity and exertion in preserving the public peace, and in support of the laws, assembled his Parishioners early on the morning of Friday, and after some hours diligent search, found the body in the river Deel. Such a spectacle of barbarous and inhuman murder has seldom been presented to a jury as that which the mangled corps exhibited before the Coroner on the inquest.

William and John Cagney (brothers) were brought into town yesterday morning, by a party of Major Wilcocks Police, charged with the above murder.

Extract of a letter from Rathkeale, dated January 16:—"On Sunday last, two proclamations, signed 'General Rock,' and written in the usual tone of law-making, about tythes, rents, and taxes, were posted on the Chapel-door of Ballesteen, near Askeaton. They were taken down by the Rev. Mr. Shanahan, Roman Catholic Curate of the Parish, who, the more effectually to prevent a repetition of such conduct, celebrated no Mass there on that day. In justice to this worthy Clergyman, I must say, and I think it right it should get publicity, that too much praise cannot be bestowed on him, for his zealous and persevering exertions since the commencement of the present disturbances, to inculcate on his flock the divine obligation of submission to the laws, and pointing out to the deluded people the blessings of peace and good order, and the wickedness and folly of their proceedings."

An Inquest was held at Cappagh, on Monday last, by John Cox, Esq. Coroner, on the body of Chute Grogan, steward to Robert Peppard, Esq. who was found dead on the road, on Sunday night, midway between the guard-room of Cappagh and his own house, distant about a quarter of mile. It appeared in evidence that he had been drinking that evening with some persons, who were examined on the Inquest, and whose testimony clearly convinced the Jury that his death was caused either by intoxication or from some natural visitation. There was no mark of violence whatever on his body.

On Tuesday, a boy about five years of age, son of Mr. Barry, Comedian, was burned to death in a house in Denmark-street, his clothes having caught fire.

On Wednesday, a fine boy was killed by a kick from a mule, in Boherbuoy.
