

the same, any such person disorderly person, unless such satisfaction of the Court of Special Munition, or offensive weapons, or their house, power, or, or their knowledge, privity, or assembled in any proclaimed or unlicensed, in which malters are sold, not being inmates of the hours of nine at night, and shall be deemed idle and disorderly. In any aforesaid proclaimed, any person or persons, who shall be deemed to have assembled in the day or evening of them, shall be deemed to be such idle and disorderly persons, and shall be transported for seven years, and sentence of the said Court shall be in like force and effect, and shall be executed, in the same manner, in which had been the lawful order, judgment, or decree of Oyer and Terminer and of the lawful for the said Court, after the person transported as aforesaid, in any such case, to order and cause such Person to be removed out of the County, if such Person is not any other Gaol in Ireland, there shall be removed and transported to any other Gaol in Ireland, shall receive and keep the custody of all Persons so transported, as if they had been transported by order of the Court of Oyer and Terminer of the County, in which the Gaol lies. In any such case, if any hawk or disperser any seditious paper, or any seditious libel, in such proclaimed District, shall be discovered to the satisfaction of the Sessions of the Peace, the Person by whom the same was received, or by whom he or she received, or by whom he or she hawked, or dispersed such Paper, or any seditious libel, or any Person within the District, shall not as such be liable to transportation, under the sentence of said Court of Oyer and Terminer, for a time not exceeding twelve months. It shall be lawful for any two Justices of the Peace, authorized by the warrant of two Justices of the Peace in any District proclaimed, and such Justices shall remain in Force, to call upon any Person in any District, who shall have registered any offensive weapon whatsoever, which he or she has in his, her, or their Possession, and search for arms and ammunition, and take and carry away all arms and ammunition, registered or not, which they may find in the Possession of, in order to preserve or to destroy the same, and dispose thereof in a place or places, and nevertheless, that the Justices or Justices, do, upon demand, give to the Person, a receipt, signifying the number of arms and ammunition, and at the end of which such District, such arms & ammunition may be taken, in and from whom the same were taken, if he or she will receive and keep the same, or may receive and keep the same, or may receive and keep the same, provided always, that the Clause contained shall affect the Person, who shall be taken, by the Majesty's Regular or Military Forces, or any Privy Councillor, or any Justice of the Peace, in respect of the same. In any such case, the Person who shall take any Person or persons, for any Offence of the same, shall immediately return the same to the Court of Oyer and Terminer of the County, in which the Gaol lies.
