MORE MURDERS, AND RENEWED OUTRAGES IN THE COUNTY OF LIMERICK.

It is a melancholy task to announce, that our County is again disgraced by another foul murder, committed in a barbarous manner and at noon day, on the high road, between this City and Rathkeale. The particulars are, that on Monday, between the hours of 2 and 3 o'clock in the afternoon, Frederick Petit, servant to William Smyth, Esq. a Magistrate, returning to his master's house at Ballylin, from Adare, was waylaid near Garranbue Castle, by a party of ruffians, who murdered him in the most cruel manner. Mr. Smyth sent immediately for Surgeon Thwaites, but before his arrival life was extinct; the Doctor reports that the unfortunate man received a duck shot in the right side—that his back was completely burned, supposed from the shots being fired at a very short distance, and that his skull was fractured in three parts—it was literally pounded to pieces by the infernal demons, who are yet, we are concerned to say, undiscovered. Petit was a native of England, and married to the daughter of George Sparling, of Adare. It is very remarkable that this is the fourth murder committed within a short time near the same spot, and deeply to be regretted that the perpetrators have evaded the hands of justice.

ANOTHER FOUL MURDER.

This moment (two o'clock,) we have been informed that Ulick Burke, Esq. returning from his farm to his dwelling at New-bridge, was murdered within one hundred yards of the village of Cappa, in this County. This dreadful occurrence took place at the early hour of four o'clock in the afternoon yesterday, by a party of fellows, who lodged several shots in his body. Mr. B. was a most inoffensive gentleman and universally esteemed.

Friday last, James Hewson, Esq. going to his farm, at Tomdeely, was fired at from behind a ditch; his life was preserved by the velocity of his horse; he, however, received a wound in his left hand.

A few nights back, a party of Insurgents attacked and broke into the houses of several persons residing on the lands of Ballybane, near Ballygran, ordering one of the Herdsmen and some of the tenants who had stock on the land, immediately to quit and take off their cattle, at the same time leaving a letter for the proprietor of these lands, containing the injunctions of Captain Steelribs, to reinstate different individuals, who some years ago, occupied divisions of this farm. They demanded arms but did not succeed in obtaining any.

taken deliberate aim at the nearest person, but unfortunately it did not go to powder having flashed in the pan, and falling down the stairs with fright—the gun, however, finding that the gun was pressed upon Captain H. and secured before he could rectify it, and then turned ill-using him. They then proceeded to the room, and took from Captain H.'s pocket a purse, containing near £10, in silver and his watch—the latter, however, was not taken. The interior of the house, as well as the furniture was completely perforated with shot, and much furniture much injured. After doing the damage they could think of, they then took off, taking with them a gun and two pistols, and on retiring, left two sentinels to prevent a pursuit being made. Captain H. was on his right arm in the defence of the house, and Valedolid, on the retreat from Ballylin, and after bravely fighting the Insurgents in the country, settled in the suburbs of the City, in a view of spending the remainder of his life in the comforts of a country life. The outrage is only about two miles from the banks of the Shannon, and in a fertile and fertile country. The fellows faces were as black as sheep raddle.

The same party afterwards went to the Ret-House on the Race Course, which was occupied by John Casey, Steven O'Brien, Esq. from whom they took a flogging in a cruel manner, and ill-treated every one in the house. They also attacked the house at Mr. O'Brien's Gate, broke the windows, destroyed the furniture, and swore the keeper to quit in one hour, to prepare for death. A notice was given the day previous to the same effect, and they held a consultation whether they should attack Mr. O'Brien's Mansion, but in the absence of some of the party that was necessary to easily effect their object, it was not done, and they then retired, firing shots.

Sunday night, fifty men dashed into the door of Mr. Bolster's house at Athlacca, in this County, and entered the room, caused him to surrender his arms, and resistance was in vain, as the fellows threatened to burn the house. They destroyed the windows and did other injury to the house, but they left untouched some bank notes; this is the second visit of the Insurgents to Mr. Bolster's.

On Saturday evening, at seven o'clock, O'Regan's house, (within one mile of the guard-house of Adare) was broken into, and a gun taken from it.

At three o'clock on Saturday night, a party of Insurgents, barefooted, entered through the window of Smythfield, the residence of Mr. Heard, North Cork Regiment, and they carried away a double barrelled gun, a blunderbuss; Smythfield, in this County.

Several notices of Captain R. Steelribs, near Adare on Saturday and
