TWO MURDERS.

Saturday night at 11 o'clock, Ballynoe House
in this County was forcibly entered by a nume-
rous gang, who in the most inhuman manner,
murdered Denis Bowen, Steward to Mr. Cox,
alleging as a cause, that he did not leave a Pound
Note for Captain Rock at a certain house which
they appointed some time since—he had four
musket shots in his body—one entered his heart
—Mr. Cox, is in the County Tipperary.

Monday night, a set of ruffians broke into the
house of Thomas Egan, a decent farmer, near
Croagh, in this county, and having placed him
on his knees, deliberately, in the presence of his
beloved nephew, fired three shots at his body—
one of them entered his heart and caused instant
death; they then marched off, exulting in their
deed, without any apprehension of fear!

THREE ATTEMPTS AT MURDER.

On Saturday last, at one o'clock, as Lieut.
Stewart, of the 42d Highlanders, in company
with Mr. C. R. Shelton, of Rossmore, was riding
near his post, at Kilmeedy, they were fired at
from behind a ditch, but providentially escaped,
the ball having passed the back of Mr. Shelton's
hat, although the distance was less than ten
yards from whence the assassin took his aim.—
A few days previous, a party of the rebels lay
in wait for this active Officer, expecting he
would walk out near Kilmeedy, but their plan
was defeated. This is the third time this
Gentleman, in discharge of his duty, has nearly
fallen a victim to the savage barbarity of those
lawless insurgents, who evidently have marked
him out as a prey. No reason can be assigned
for this apparent dislike, but his very great
activity in patrolling, and searching suspicious
persons.

About two o'clock, on Saturday, a servant
