

MURDER OF A MAIL POST-BOY, AND A DRAGOON SHOT.

Yesterday evening, at seven o'clock, Henry Shehan, conveying the mail from Rathkeale to Shanagolden and the Kerry line, and one escort of the 3d Light Dragoons, were fired at by some ruffians from behind a ditch, who killed the post-man and his horse, wounded the dragoon, and took off the mail---the occurrence took place so near the town of Rathkeale, in this County, that the shots were heard by the Police and 42d, who instantly repaired to the scene, and found the Postman weltering in his blood---he was conveyed to the military hospital, where he languished in extreme agony, and breathed his last at twelve o'clock---the Dragoon (who fired four shots) is badly wounded in the thigh; a vigilant pursuit was set up for the perpetrators, and several fellows were taken up, who, if not concerned in the murder, will be tried under the Insurrection Act.

BURNING OF THE HOUSE AND OFFICES OF THOMAS FURLONG, ESQ. BALLYDANIEL, IN THE MIDDLE OF THE DAY.

About the hour of two o'clock on Thursday, the house and offices of Ballydaniel were discovered on fire from the town of Newcastle, when several Gentlemen and Officers repaired to the attic story of the Castle of Lord Courtenay, where they could plainly perceive the flames, a distance of four miles. A party of the 3d Dragoons and some Police instantly went to the protection of the house and property, but every atom was consumed, with several barrels of potatoes which were in an out-house. The outrage was perpetrated by eight men in womens' apparel, with their faces blackened, and well armed, who remained for a considerable time viewing the conflagration.

Wednesday night, 31 cows, the property of Edw. Carte, Esq. were taken off the lands of Doally, within a mile of Newcastle, by a large party of insurgents, who fired several shots, and left a guard on the herdsman's house, lest he should see the direction they were conveyed to; the same night 15 sheep were stolen from John Sheehy, an industrious farmer, and 14 cows from Ardagh: this makes nearly 100 head of cattle stolen within the last week, and it's extraordinary that no trace can be had of them.

On the night of Thursday last, the Farm House of Killenemona, occupied by Dennis Flaherty, situate within half a mile of the Town of Ballingarry, and a military post, was attacked by an armed banditti, who maliciously burned said House and a great quantity of property therein, belonging to Flaherty, who incurred the displeasure of the newly assumed governor "Rock"—The House was the property of Mr.

Captain Drought's police have been in patrolling the Liberties, and succeeded in getting some fire arms and ammunition.
