

night of Thursday last, the Farm Killenemona, occupied by Dennis O'Connell, and a military post, was attacked by banditti, who maliciously burned a great quantity of property belonging to Flaherty, who incurred the displeasure of the newly assumed governor. The House was the property of Mr. Glenwilliam.

On the same night, twenty-eight Cows which were grazing on the Lands of Ballykevan, parish of Ballingarry, the property of Mr. O'Riaghnessy, were entirely plundered: seven of them were slaughtered on the road near Ballykevan, within a mile or less of a Military

House on the lands of Ballygran, the property of Alexander Odell, Esq. which had hitherto been occupied by an officer and party of the regt. were, on the night of the 25th inst. maliciously and feloniously consumed by fire, which he has suffered £200 damages.

On Wednesday night, a soldier of the 3d Regiment, passing over the bridge of Rathfriland, with his wife, who was a little in the rear, and a man wrapped in a large coat, and pretending to be screening something, called on the husband, who instantly seized him, and a pistol concealed in his breast. He was immediately committed to prison.

At the marker's house of Taulagh, near Tralee, a cow and 1 horse were consumed. Denis O'Riaghnessy's houses, of Abbeyfeale, were burned on Sunday night.

For several nights since, a lodge built by Richard O'Connell, of Chute-hall, Esq. on part of his estate, in the neighbourhood of Abbeyfeale, and which was suspected might be used as a military rendezvous for the army, was burned to the ground by a party of insurgents, who now riot at will in the mountainous part of the country.

On Monday night, a shot was fired at Captain O'Connell, of Kilcoleman, eldest son of Sir John O'Connell, by which he was severely wounded, the shot ball having lodged in his thigh.

The County Kerry was placed under the operation of the Act on Thursday last.

On Sunday, the Rev. Mr. O'Sullivan, P. P. of Ballymacconnell, co. Kerry, was examined at some length by the Magistrates in Cork, touching the reasons for withholding the information he possesses are stated in the paper published in first page.

The house of Mr. Thomas Murray, at Waterford, near Cork, was robbed of arms, on Wednesday night. On Friday night, a fruitless attempt was made by the insurgents to take arms from the house of the Rev. Mr. Tuckey, Rector of the moleague. Mr. Burke's house at Turagh, was entered on Sunday night, by 100 men; Mr. Burke being obliged to flee, and the men, armed having any arms—they attempted to search him and then broke open the desk and took away bank notes and papers therefrom. Several other houses in the county Cork have also been entered.

On the night, the house of George Davis, Esq.
