FROM THE LIMERICK NEWS OF MONDAY, MARCH 11.

On Saturday evening, Baron Pennefather, one
 of the Judges of Assize for the Munster Circuit,
 arrived in this City from Dublin, with an escort
 of the 3d light dragoons. This morning, his
 Lordship, accompanied by Poole Hickman, Esq.
 High Sheriff of the County of Clare, proceeded
 for Ennis, to open the commission, escorted by
 Major Warburton and forty of his matchless
 Police. In passing through our streets, they ex-
 hibited the most martial and soldier-like appear-
 ance; the steadiness of the men, the regularity
 of their movements, and the neatness of their
 appointments, denote the careful attention of the
 Commanding Officer, to whom such a corps is
 highly creditable, as well as to the County
 which sustains it.

Serjeant Lefroy is to accompany Baron
 Pennefather on the Munster Circuit, in place of
 Mr. Justice Vandeleur, who has been taken
 suddenly ill in Dublin. Serjeant Lefroy will
 arrive here to-morrow, and a detachment of the
 County Clare Police are in waiting to accom-
 pany him.

It must be gratifying to our Readers to learn,
 that Government have intimated to the proper
 Officers, their determination of making the City
 and Liberties of Limerick liable to only one
 third of the charge and expences of the Extra-
 ordinary Establishment of Police.

On Saturday last, a number of fellows went
 upon the lands of Banemore, in the South
 Liberties of this City, to tear down the fences
 of a farm, the property of John Brown, Esq.—
 Patrick Hart, the man in care of it, opposed
 them, when they knocked him down, and threw
 large stones on his body, which deprived him
 of life in a few minutes. Mr. Brown has acted
 in his uniform benevolent manner to the poor,
 during the severe weather, by ordering coals to
 be issued from his Distillery at a reduced price;
 together with other bountiful donations. The
 return made him for these benevolent acts, is
 the murder of Hart.

A very honest farmer, of the name of
 Ambrose, was found dead on Thursday, near his
 house, within a mile of Newcastle, in this Co.—
 no marks of violence being on the body, it is
 conjectured he must have fallen into a small
 river, from off the bridge, being intoxicated.

Major Maxwell arrested on Saturday night, in
 the vicinity of Charleville, two notorious cha-
 racters, in whose possession loaded arms were
 found; one of them was in the act of killing a
 stolen sheep. They will be tried under the In-
 surrection Act in Limerick.
