A few nights ago, an armed party entered a farmers house at Clouty, County Tipperary, and left a notice directing Mr. Pennfather, of Marlow, to discharge some faithful servants, on pain of assassinating Mr. P., his son, and houghing their cattle.

The Rev. Mr. Riall, Curate to the Rev. T. Grady, was fired at near Carrick, on Wednesday. A pursuit being set up the perpetrator and his companion were taken, and are lodged in Jail—their names are John and Wm. Buller.

Mr. Blennerhasset's cottage, at Churchtown, County Kerry, was totally burned by the insurgents, on Monday night.

On Saturday night, a party of insurgents went to the house of a farmer, named Herlihy, and cut off one of his ears; they also broke his furniture. The houses of Lucett and Barrett, near Tralee, were also attacked, and their farming implements broken.

Several houses in the barony of Knocktopher, County Kilkenny, were robbed of fire-arms, this week.

Nine fishermen were drowned off Cape Clear on Friday.

The following has been received by Counsellor O'orman, from Earl Donoughmore:—
Knocklofty, 10th March, 1822.

DEAR SIR—I have had the honor of receiving your letter of the 1st inst. accompanied by copies of the Petition adopted and of the resolutions entered into, at the aggregate meeting of the Roman Catholics of Ireland, on the 13th of February last, at which you acted as their Secretary—and you desire to be apprised of the time, at which it will be convenient to me, to receive the engrossment of the Petition, and the signatures thereto, in order that the same may be presented at such time during the present session, as shall appear to me most beneficial to the Catholic interests.

As its not my present intention to proceed by the way of Dublin, so soon as the state of the country shall enable me to attend my duty in Parliament; and as I cannot therefore expect to have the pleasure of receiving these documents directly from your own hands, perhaps no more advisable mode could be suggested, than that the Petition, with the annexed signatures, should be transmitted for me to an esteemed friend of mine, Mr. A. R. Blake, of Lincoln's-Inn, who must be well known to you as a respected member of your own profession, and than whom there is no man more interested in the success of the just claims of the Roman Catholic body.

In discharging the duty which you have so often confided to me, I can never have any difficulty as to the manner of bringing the question forward for the consideration of Parliament, as it has always been my decided conviction, that the entire removal of the disabling statutes will, in itself, furnish the best possible security to the Protestant State. So far as relates to the time at which the discussions should most advantageously take place, that must be decided, as I conceive, by the opinions of your most zealous and experienced Parliamentary friends—and as to the priority to be given to the discussion in one House in preference to the other, the inducements ought, as it appears to me, to be very strong, indeed, which would justify your advocate, under all the present circumstances, in committing the subject to the hazard of debate for the first time during the present session, in the upper House; and relinquishing thereby all the advantages of that success, which had recently attended the question in the other House of Parliament, in the first stage of its progress.

The undivided attention which I felt it my imperative duty to devote, as a Magistrate of this country—and the only one of its Governors in attendance—to the extraordinary sessions of the peace under the Insurrection Act, for several days past, made it impossible for me to reply as promptly as I could have wished, to your communication of the 1st instant.
