Patrick Coll, James Tuohill, James Nash,  
and John Shea, for attacking Mr. Sparling's  
house, to be hanged at Adare, on Wednesday  
next, the 3d of April.

George Walker, for burglary at the house of  
John Shire, and demanding powder to make  
balls, to be hanged at Newcastle, on Wednes-  
day, the 10th of April; and Edmond Fitz-  
gerald, school-master, and John Kelly, for  
attacking Mr. Morgan's house, to be hanged at  
Shanagolden, on same day.

William Dunworth, William Nunan, Patrick  
Nugent, and James Callinan, for robbing arms  
from the 40th Regiment, to be hanged at Bal-  
lyagran, on Saturday, the 18th of April. The  
number ordered for execution is fifteen.

Jeremiah Roche, for forgery, to be trans-  
ported for fourteen years; and Michael Clifford,  
for larceny, to be transported for seven years.

This morning, at eight o'clock, John Lynch,  
Patrick Lewis, and Michael Madigan, were  
taken from the New County Jail to the village  
of Cappa, where they are to be hanged, pursuant  
to sentence at last Assizes. They are all young  
men, and are supposed to be principals in the  
outrages which disgraced that part of the  
country. Lewis stated that he was at the attack  
at Sparlings. It is thought the three will make  
a full disclosure at the Gallows.

Monday, Baron Peunefather and Mr. Serjeant  
Lefroy arrived at Tralee—they are to return  
here on the 16th of April, and proceed with the  
Assizes business, which is most considerable.  
The County Presentments were not received.

One hundred and eighty-three are for trial at  
Tralee; sixty-two of whom are on white-  
charges.

At Philipstown Assizes ten were sentenced to  
be hanged, amongst whom were four brothers  
named Keegan, apprehended a few days ago at  
Derry for the murder of the Murphys. It ap-  
peared in evidence, during the trial, that Cusack,  
who was executed for the same offence at the pre-  
ceding Assizes, had formed the design of cutting  
the tongue out of Murphy's sister after she was  
murdered. The business at this Assizes is so  
very considerable that Lord Norbury and the  
Lord Chief Baron have adjourned them to the  
14th April.
