

This day, a respite was received for thirteen men under sentence of death in our County Jail...
The following arms have been delivered up to Lieut.-Colonel Dick, 42d Royal Highlanders, since the 10th of April:--From the Rev. Mr. Lee, P. P. Rathkeale, 3 guns, 1 pistol, and 2 swords, in good order; from the Rev. Mr. Halfpenny, P. P. Cappa, 2 guns, 1 pistol, 2 bayonets, serviceable, and one gun barrel; from the Rev. Mr. O'Halloran, P. P. Askeaton, 3 guns, 1 blunderbuss, the latter and two of the guns in good order; from the Rev. Mr. Fitzgerald, P. P. Knockaderry, 3 guns, 1 pistol, in good order.
On Thursday last, two men, who were suspected to have been engaged in the late disturbances, namely Edmond O'Felan and John Fitzgerald, voluntarily came forward to the Rev. Mr. Fitzgerald, Parish Priest of Knockaderry, and surrendered to him two guns in excellent condition. The Rev. Gentleman in and at the suggestion of the former took the arms, which they laid down to Colonel Dick, of allegiance and in his presence received a pardon from their Clergymen upon the solemn and importance of their undertaking, and importance of their undertakings, would mark out to them that the slightest deviation or opposition to the laws, in being engaged in their old pursuits, would mark them with the additional and irreparable crime of perjury.
