Thirteen Convicts, from Ennis Jail, under an

An attempt was made last night by some vil-

 since of £6 in cash, and some wearing apparel.

 ations in the barony of Tulla, bordering on  
 Galway, from which it is supposed they have  
 come. The Police are on the alert for their  
 detection, and we entertain hopes of their suc-  
 cess.—*Ennis Paper.*
