Griffin, of Newcastle, which he distributed with the strictest precision and impartiality to the different applicants in the surrounding district, and which had been most gratefully received and acknowledged as a particular favor from that benevolent Society, by the Peasantry.

Pursuant to Requisition, signed by forty Magistrates, the Clerk of the Peace of the County Tipperary has called a Sessions of the Peace, to be held at Cashel, on Wednesday, the 19th instant, and at Nenagh, on Thursday, the 27th instant, "for the purpose of considering the expediency of preparing a Petition to Parliament, praying that the Insurrection Act may not be allowed to expire on the 1st day of August next, but that it may be renewed, from and after that day, to such time as the Parliament in its wisdom may deem necessary."

On Monday, the Mayor and City Magistrates commenced a most arduous undertaking, that of delivering out the cargo of potatoes sent to them from Barnstaple, which arrived here on Sunday. They were sold at three-pence per stone, in single stones to the poor: and notwithstanding every precaution was used to preserve regularity among the applicants, the Magistrates were so impeded that the delivery was obliged to be suspended for hours from the great press of men, women and children, all seeking to be supplied at once. — Captain Drought and his Police, however, have enabled them to continue the sale this morning by keeping the gates of the Custom-house closed and letting in a few persons at a time at one gate, and returning by the other with their supply.

£500 is granted by Government for relief of the poor in Kerry.

The ship New Delight, with 65 tons of potatoes, has been sent by Government to Tralee for the poor.

Stafford O'Brien, Esq. of Blatherwick Park, with his usual benevolence, has directed Mr. M'Mahon to give £50 towards alleviating the distress of the Poor in the neighbourhood of his estates, in the County of Clare, and also directed £50 more to be paid to the general fund for the relief of the distressed of said County.

One hundred Pounds has been sent by the London Committee for the Poor of Dromcolloher.

The timely relief sent by Government, and the subscriptions entered into at Kanturk, have, in a great measure, stopped the progress of famine in that part of the country. A number of the poor are daily employed, and receive payment by meal and money.
