MEETING AT ATHLACCA.

A numerous and respectable Meeting of the Landholders and Parishioners of ATHLACCA, DROMIN, MTH and WEST UREGARE, held at ATHLACCA, County of Limerick, on WEDNESDAY the 5th day of June, 1822, convened by Public Notice, for the pur- suing into consideration the situation of the dis- tressed and indigent Poor of said Parishes.

The Rev. EDWARD CROKER in the Chair,
The following Resolutions were unanimously agreed

Resolved—That the following Gentlemen do act as a committee to carry the purposes of this Meeting into effect, whom to be a quorum:—The Rev. Edward Croker, Richard Ievers, Robert H. Ievers, John Blennerhassett, G. Gubbins, and James Ievers, Esqrs. the Rev. Charles McCarthy, P. P. of Dromin, the Rev. John McCarthy, P. P. of Dromin,
Resolved—That Robert H. Ievers, Esq. do act as Treasurer and Secretary.

Resolved—That we forthwith pay to our Treasurer the sums annexed to our names, and that applications for relief be also made to the respective Absentee Proprietors having Estates within said Parishes, and Committees formed in London, Dublin, and Limerick, in behalf of the Poor of this Kingdom.

Resolved—That it appears to this Meeting that there is a want of Provisions in this Country, but that from the total want of employment the labouring Poor are reduced to the most distressing and distress, and in want of the necessary means of subsistence. That in consequence of the scarcity of the last season, as well as the reduced price of all sorts of Grains, Butter, Flux, and all descriptions of Cattle, the Landholders are much reduced and unable to afford the wonted assistance to their neighbouring Poor, which they want are increased and render them fitter for the consideration of the humane and charita-

Resolved—That the attention of the Committee be directed to the first instance, to the purchase of seed Potatoes, (as far as circumstances will admit,) to the repair of roads within the Barony of Coshma, liable to Presentment by which the future Baronial levy for repairs of roads is lessened, the distress of the occupying Farmer and the Poor thereby alleviated, and useful and beneficial employment supplied to the well-disposed and industrious Labourer.
Resolved—That the respective Parochial Committees for relief of the Poor within said Baronies, be requested to take the foregoing Resolution into their serious consideration, that inasmuch as the Grand Jury levies for the repair of Roads are Baronial, so that the benefits arising from such expenditure may be reciprocally felt throughout the County.

Resolved—That these Resolutions be made Public, and the Treasurer's accounts be laid before the Committee for their consideration.

Resolved—That the thanks of this Meeting are justly due to the generous and noble minded Englishmen who with the characteristic liberality of their Country have subscribed to relieve the necessities of the inhabitants of this Country. To his Excellency the Marquis Wellesley our thanks are pre-eminently due; as also the Noble and Gentlemen contributing to the support of the said Committee within this Kingdom, for their exertions in relieving many thousands of our distressed Countrymen from the miseries of starvation.

Resolved—That the thanks of this Meeting are also due to the Rev. Charles McCarthy, P. P. of Dromin, and the Rev. John McCarthy, P. P. of Athlacca, for their zeal and indefatigable exertions in taking an account of the suffering who are in immediate want of relief.
