John Guerin, who was shot near Six-Mile-Bridge, County Clare, on Sunday night, as stated in our last, died last night of his wounds after enduring very considerable agony.

Yesterday morning, the Staff of the 43d marched hence for Galway, from whence this Regiment will detach parties to Loughrea, Portumna, Ballinasloe, Outerard, Mount-Shannon, Athenry, and Headfort.

A detachment of the 79th Highlanders, under Captain Young, ~~left~~ Templemore, for Tipperary.

The Scots Greys are ordered to Edinburgh, and the 14th Dragoons to Coventry.

The 61st Regiment are now doing duty at Portsmouth.

Two Captains and sixty men of the Buffs are ordered to embark, in equal proportions, at Deptford, on board the Arab and Eliza convict ships, as guards, for New South Wales.

On Tuesday, about three o'clock in the afternoon, arrived at the Pigeon-house, Dublin, in the Intrepid transport, three companies of the Royal Artillery, from Woolwich, Dover, and Portsmouth. Two companies of them went to Island-bridge, and the other remained on board until Thursday, when the two companies that were relieved embarked with them. Major D. Campbell, with two companies, will sail for Gibraltar, and Major M'Loughlin for Corfu. The men appeared to be in excellent health and spirits.

Sir David Baird's command in Ireland ceases on the 24th inst. and will be succeeded by a Lieutenant-General. The office of Adjutant-General and Quarter-Master-General in Ireland will also cease on that day.

Serjeant Lloyd will hold a Sessions under the Insurrection Act, in the City Cork, on Monday next.

The Kilkenny Assizes commence on the 1st of August. The Lord Chief Justice presides.

Doctor Bell is appointed Master of the Diocesan School at Banagher.

It is stated that the Rev. John Whitty, of Tulla, succeeds to the Archdeaconry of Kilsfenora, and that the Rev. Richard Brew, Curate of Kilsfenora, is to have Tulla.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer will not consent to any additional Duty ou Foreign Butter.

Mr. Killaly, Engineer, appointed by the Lord Lieutenant to visit the County Clare, is now at Ennis, and this day meets the Acting Overseers, named in the several presentments, granted at the last Spring Assizes of that County, with a view to employ the peasantry in such works as may be necessary.

The commissioners of Fisheries, in consequence of receiving an aid of one-fourth the expense from the Mansion-house Committee, have agreed to construct small piers for the pro-

Thursday, at Tralee, from England.

The sloop Hibernia, from Baltimore, Cork, arrived yesterday at this port, with toes for sale.

We are assured by a respectable Gentleman that more than half the land in the western part of the half barony of Tulla, County Clare, remains untilled for want of seed potatoes.

Thirteen thousand two hundred persons are destitute of food in the County of Cork. The public and private subscriptions amount to £11,000.

One man died on Wednesday in the parish of Clondegad, Co. Clare, from want—the others there are in a state of actual starvation.

Fever is sadly increasing in several Baronies of the County Clare.

We regret to learn that there are a number of Fever Cases in the town of Mallow, and some respectable individuals have already fallen victims to the malignity of the disease.

In the surrounding country there is great distress. The benevolence of the respected family of James Cotter, Bart. has been exerted to mitigate it as much as possible, by a generous subscription of £20 and the distribution of Potatoes, of which there is great want.

A noted offender, of the name of Grace, apprehended last week, in the neighborhood of Ogonnelloe, by a party of Captain M'Killaloe Infantry, and sent to Ennis Jail.

A man charged with the murder of the crown witness, was apprehended by the 1st Regiment near Shanagolden, on Wednesday.

A verdict of Wilful Murder is returned against William Nelson, of the 52d Regiment, sentinel at Scagh, Co. Kilkenny, who killed Rowe there on the 6th inst.

Wednesday evening, a girl bathing near Diamond-Gate, would inevitably have perished for the assistance of Michael M'Namara, who risked his life just as she sunk in a exhausted state, the third time.

The different bathing places on the County coast are beginning to be crowded with visitors. The fine weather has induced several to themselves of the Lady of the Shannon Packet, plying between this and Kilrush, which has, from this day, reduced its cabin passengers.

A cargo of best red apple potatoes, from the County of Cork, has this day commenced at Arthur's-quay. The quality of these potatoes is extremely good, and being in excellent condition, we would recommend them to the notice of the Gentlemen of the respective Committees for the purpose of seed.
