DEATHS.

On Sunday last, at Newcastle, in this County, Sergeant-
 Major William Stone, of the first battalion, Rifle Brigade.
 His remains were interred on Tuesday, with true Masonic,
 and all military honours. Never had the town of New-
 castle witnessed so solemn and impressive a scene as on this
 occasion. The Brothers of the brave 42d Regiment, from
 Rathkeale, by the particular consent of their noble Com-
 mander, Colonel Dak, repaired to the funeral at two o'clock.
 The procession moved to the Church, attended by Colonel
 Norcott and the other Officers and men of the 1st battalion,
 Rifle Brigade, whose condolence, as also that of Doctor
 Burke and Quartermaster Sirtees, in appearing in their
 Masonic costume, marked the soldier and the gentlemen,
 and conveyed a strong sense of the real worth and merit of
 the departed brother and soldier. The funeral service
 performed, and concluded by the Rev. Thomas Locke,
 Rector of Newcastle, the procession proceeded to the burial
 ground, about a quarter of a mile from the town, in regular
 Masonic order, followed by every soldier of the corps in
 quarters, the band and bugles playing appropriate tunes
 alternately. Scarcely was such a concourse of people wit-
 nessed in Newcastle. Ladies and Gentlemen from the sur-
 rounding country joined the mournful scene. Arrived at
 the grave, and the usual Masonic and Military funeral cere-
 monies performed, Doctor Burke, Surgeon of the Rifle
 Brigade, advanced towards the coffin, and in a most ener-
 getic and impressive manner, recited an oration on the tran-
 sitory life and vanity of man, and afterwards read a detail
 of the gallant and active services of the deceased through
 the campaigns in Portugal, Spain, France, and at Waterloo,
 finally dwelling particularly on his steady obedience to his
 Officers, his strict adherence to orders, and perfect discipline,
 his zeal for religion, due reverence to his Creator, and
 unbounded loyalty to his King and country; while living,
 he dealt with honour and honesty, ever making that golden
 precept the standard rule of his actions, and he fully enjoyed
 as he merited, the high confidence of his Colonel and Officers,
 the respect and esteem of his brother sergeants, and the love
 and gratitude of the privates.
