The Coach from Cork to Kilmahoy departed  
 Monday, and Mr. Parks, brother of Lieutenant-  
 Colonel Parks, 39th, was severely injured.

Wednesday last, John Flock, a private in  
 the 57th Regiment, was wounded in the instep  
 by his musket accidentally going off, whilst in  
 the act of cleaning it—the wound was so danger-  
 ous that the leg was obliged to be amputated  
 in the course of the day.

Wednesday evening, Christopher Kelly, a

 vious indisposition, fell down suddenly and  
 expired.

The Register to the Archbishop of Tuam has  
 issued the following notice:

"The Archbishop of Tuam, feeling that (during this awful  
 ravage of Divine Visitation, which so grievously afflicts his  
 Archbishopric of Tuam,) the minds and bodies of his Clergy  
 should be almost exclusively devoted to the administration  
 of relief in their respective districts, to their suffering pro-  
 ple; I am commanded by his Grace to notify his intention of  
 holding no Visitation during this Summer, and thus to avoid  
 removing his Clergy, even for one day, from their important  
 Posts."

One hundred and forty persons have died of  
 starvation and fever in one Parish in the County  
 Mayo, during the short space of ten days.

Twenty-seven persons have died in the parish  
 of Ballinakill, County Mayo, by famine; and  
 many have died of typhus and dysentery occa-  
 sioned by starvation.

The Central Committee of the County Cork  
 met on Thursday, and agreed to apply to Go-  
 vernment to grant £2500 weekly for five weeks,  
 to relieve the distressed in that County, whose  
 number is stated at 200,000 individuals—the  
 grants to the different Parishes are expended in  
 employment.

Fever is advancing in frightful strides through  
 some baronies in the County Clare.

Fever is spreading to an alarming extent at

Distress is now felt in the County Kilkenny  
 and King's County.

The Commissary General has sent Doctor  
 Burke, of the Rifle Brigade, £50, for the relief  
 of the fever poor of Newcastle; a liberal sup-  
 ply of medicine is also provided for the poor  
 patients by Alfred Furlong, Esq. Agent to the  
 Courtenay Estate.

Doctor Birch has been sent by Government to  
 attend the sick at Erris, County Mayo.

Seven hundred bags of Rice are shipped at  
 London for the poor of Tralee.

The late Henry Downing, Esq. has left £520  
 to various charities in Dublin and Derry.

On Sunday, at Cove Church, £55 12s. were  
 collected for the poor.

The Chief Officer, Mr. Tobias Bowden, with  
 the crew of the Preventive Waterguard, sta-  
 tioned at Kilkee, have liberally given one day's  
 pay for the relief of the suffering poor of the  
 County of Clare, through their Inspecting Com-  
 mander Captain Cobb, R. N. We understand  
 that the other stations of that respectable body,  
 on the Western Coast, intend following the  
 example so laudably set by Mr. Bowden, whose  
 benevolent attentions to the poor of Kilkee, have  
 deservedly won him the respect and esteem of  
 that neighbourhood.
