NOTICE TO MARINERS.

OWNERS of the NORTHERN LIGHT
 give Notice, that a BEACON has
 been placed on the Carr Rock, of the position and
 the following Specification is given
 by the Engineer:—

It is the seaward ledge of a range of
 rocks about two miles from Fifeness, at
 the mouth of Forth, on the eastern coast of
 Scotland, latitude 56 deg. 17 min. and longitude
 from London. By compass it bears S.
 11° E. distant 11 miles, and from
 the Carr Rock, distant 8 miles.
 The Carr Rock Beacon is a circular
 structure measuring 15 feet in diameter, which
 is supported by six pillars of cast-iron, terminating
 in a spiral, which is elevated about 25 feet
 above the level of the sea: the whole is built to
 resemble a vessel under sail at the distance
 of 10 miles.

The Beacon has been attended with great
 success during six years, in the course of which
 it has sustained occasional damage. Mariners are
 advised to run for the Carr Rock Beacon,
 both on account of its exposure to the
 wind and its liability to receive damage from
 the sea.
