The Castlebar Paper states, that no improper application of the funds for the relief of the poor in the County Mayo, has taken place, and to restore the confidence in which the Central Committee is held by the London Committee, a sum of £1,600 and a vast quantity of oatmeal, &c. were received from them on Saturday. On the last day of the Assizes, at Athy, the Jurors, who were impanelled to try two men for burglary, not having agreed, were locked up, in the Jury room, all night; and the next morning the Sheriff provided them with twelve asses drawing a car with a kish in it. Into a cart each Juror was politely handed, and the cart having been drawn up in line, the cavalcade proceeded on in slow and solemn procession, amidst shouts and cheers of the populace to the relief of the County.

GRAND JURY ROOM, ENNIS, JULY 22, 1822.

Resolved That we the Grand Jury of the County of Ennis assembled at Summer Assizes, 1822, have read with attention the Resolutions which were adopted, favourable to the commutation of Tythes, at a Meeting of Peers and Members of the House of Commons connected with Ireland, assembled in London in the month of June last. That a Commutation of Tythe, on the principle of a full and equal equivalent, would be, in our opinion, not only advantageous to the Clergy of the Established Church, but also to the poor of that description, and that Commissioners are expected by the Government on this point this day.

Resolutions have been favoured by an active Member of the London Tavern Committee with a List of names of Remittances made by the Committee for the Relief of the Poor in Ireland up to the 20th instant.

—There have been remitted to Mayo upwards of £14,030, including half of £1900 received by the Archbishop of Tuam for the use of the Poor of this County of Galway. The names of the parties to whom the sums were sent, and the dates of the remittances, are set forth in the Document.—To this County the London Committee have remitted, in different specified sums, and at different periods, £16,655.
