On Tuesday last, at Cashel, on his route to Athlone,
 whither he was proceeding with his regiment, Eyre Butler,

 ously until his arrival at Cashel, where the most skilful
 and prompt medical assistance proved ineffectual. He was

 officiating Clergyman, and to the latest moment of his exis-
 tence, evinced the greatest piety and resignation. His
 remains were conveyed to the Cathedral Church-yard, by the
 52d Regiment, and interred with military honours. Colonel
 Rowan and the Officers of his corps were present—the entire
 arrangements were conducted by them, and nothing was
 omitted on their part which could be considered complimen-
 tary on the melancholy occurrence. The afflicted friends of
 the deceased, who arrived but a short time previous to the
 procession, had nothing left but to approve of, and express
 their gratitude on the occasion.
