Monday, Thomas Halpin, Patrick Hennessy, Edmond Hennessy, and John Dorgan, were executed, pursuant to sentence, at the drop in front of the new County Jail, for the murder of James Buckley, a crown witness—the three former acknowledged the justice of their sentence, but the latter declared he had no participation in the crime for which he suffered.

William Costelloe was hanged at Cork on Saturday, for the abduction of Miss Gould; Walter Fitzmaurice, alias Captain Rock, for the same crime; and Denis Duggan, William Lamb, and John Cahill, who were to be executed on Saturday, were respited.

The following who were convicted at the County Assizes, and sentenced to be hanged, are respited:—

- James Fitzmaurice, for burglary in the house of Michael Burke White, Esq.; Patrick Deenen, for taking a sword from Captain Johnson; Owen Sullivan, for burglary and felony, and assembling in arms by night; Arthur Walker, for burglary and felony in the house of John Shire; John Riedy, for attacking and demolishing the house of Patrick Griffin; William, Patrick, Denis, Jeremiah, John, and William Connors, John Leane, Eugene and Patrick Sweeny, for burglary and robbery in the house of Patrick Hayes, Esq.; Mortough Duun, for burglary and robbery in the house of Thomas Keane; David Shea, for burglary and felony; John Galvin, for burglary and felony in the house of Maurice Connell.

The following persons were forwarded from Clonmel to Cork, for transportation, under the Insurrection Act: Lanty Gailmartin, Joseph Marksby, Maurice Collins, John Coffee, John Teehy, Edward Burys, Joseph Stanton, James Renihan, Michael McNamara, James Regan, John Walsh, John Grady, and James Nowlan.

NEW CHOL. ACT.

We lay before our Readers the following clause of this Act (3d Geo. IV. cap. 65), as containing important information of Creditors and Debtors for sums under Pounds:—

Provided always and be it enacted, that in all cases where any person shall be confined or detained in any Prison, at the Suit of any Creditor, for any debt less than the sum of Five Pounds, it shall be lawful for the Court, or Judge, or Justice, before whom such Process from which such Debtor shall be detained, on the application of such Debtor, or on the application of such Debtor's Creditor, in any such case, shall think right under the circumstances of the case so to do, to order such Debtor to be discharged, or to order such Debtor to be confined or imprisoned, to pay to such Creditor or Creditors, at whose suit such Debtor shall be confined or imprisoned, to pay to such Debtor such sum or sums, not exceeding the sum of Five Pounds, at such time and in such manner as the Court shall direct; and that on failure of payment thereof, as directed by such Court, or Judge, or Justice, such Debtor shall forthwith be discharged from custody, at the Suit of the Creditor or Creditors, failing to pay the same.

THE POTATO CROP.

The time is now approaching when the important crop is exposed to danger from frost. The destruction of the plants by frost and the icicles formed during the night being upon by the rays of the sun, and consequent will be prevented by those icicles being broken off. This can be done by two men at the ends of a rope of twelve or fourteen fathoms long, and drawing it, extended tight, down the field. Ten or twelve drills, or three beds, are thus cleared together from icicles. Careful observations will always enable the farmer to perceive the approach of frost, to give directions to have the work done hours before sun rise. The success depends upon its being completed before that time.
