DUBLIN, SEPTEMBER 12.

Messages from New York, to the 16th ult. have been received by the house of Messrs. W. Hannan and Co. of Londonderry, which, we are enabled to say, state that the yellow fever had assumed a more alarming aspect. The cases had multiplied and extended, that the Corporation had barricaded the streets from the City to the North River, and from the latter to the Battery, by Broadway. The whole of this district had been deserted, and new cases had occurred outside the barriers. The French Bank had removed, and the British Consul had removed his office to the family residence at Manhattan-house, two miles from the city, and his family to near Stamford, on the East River.
