A lawless mob has cut the Canal at Black-
 water, near Mullingar, and on Sunday night, a
 packet-boat, lying in that town, was attempted
 to be demolished.

The High Sheriff of the County Cork has, in
 a letter to the Proprietor of a Cork Paper, stated,
 that only five outrages occurred within the last
 three months through the northern districts of
 the County, but that a spirit of insubordination
 exists to a considerable degree in the parish of
 Doneraile.
