plagued with distress, arising from

of the High Sheriff. He complimented the
High Sheriff's conduct, and declared his
opinion in any thing which might
benefit the country, and particularly
the modification of Tythes and
the law as tending to relieve the

Resolution was passed unanimously, when
Mr. Croke moved to move an Address to
the High Sheriff, which was seconded by Mr.
Croke, who bore testimony to the
services rendered by that distinguished
Magistrate. The Resolution was
passed with the warmest demonstrations of
respect.

Mr. Croke, having left the Chair, and
Mr. Rice being called to it, Colonel
Croke, and, in a strain of most
eloquent compliment, moved the
High Sheriff's Requisition to the High Sheriff,
seconded by Mr. Rice.

Mr. P. then rose, and said
that he had the opportunity pass without
doing justice to the merits of the High
Sheriff's address, he com-
plimented on their firm, and, at
the same time, on the moderate conduct on all the late
occasions, which had more
character from the foul asper-
sions insinuated, rather than

discharged his various duties.

Thanks were also proposed to Richard Wil-
cock, Esq. for his gentlemanly, spirited, and
humane conduct in his capacity as Chief Magis-
trate of this County—passed with acclamation,
and most unanimously adopted.

It was agreed to, that application should be
made to Government for an additional Military
force to be stationed in the county, during the
winter.

Sunday last, John Cox, Esq. Coroner, held
an Inquisition at Adare, on the body of Francis
M'Innis, who was mortally wounded whilst
executing a Magistrate's warrant near Croagh,
as stated in our last. The investigation occu-
pied nearly the entire day, and at a late hour
the Jury, which was respectable, returned the
following verdict:

"We find that the deceased, Francis M'Innis,
Police Constable, came by his death in conse-
quence of a gun shot wound which he received
in his head in the execution of his duty, from a
man named Michael Fitzgerald, aided and
assisted by a man named John Madagin."

They are both lodged in the County Jail.

On Friday, a Court of Special Sessions was
held in Cork, under the Insurrection Act, at
which, as usual, Mr. Serjeant Lloyd presided,
assisted by Samuel Hobson, Esq. Barrister.

The following Magistrates were present:—
Alexander O'Driscoll, Francis Woodley, John
G. Newsom, Thomas Hornibrook, Daniel Egan,
Timothy O'Driscoll, and W. P. White, Esqrs.

John Luehan, committed by H. B. Foot, Esq.
and charged with being absent from his place
of abode on the night of the 14th of September,
and for same offence on the night following—
Acquitted.

Saturday, Mr. M'Cartney held a Sessions
under the Insurrection Act, at Tralee. Nine
Magistrates were present. John M'Carthy,
James Elligott, George Naughten, Thomas
Breen, James Connor, and John Hourigan were
placed at the bar, but their trials were not pro-
ceeded on, and an adjournment took place to
Tuesday.

The County Tipperary Magistrates, in Ses-
sion, are to meet at Roscrea, on Saturday next,
to make application to the Lord Lieutenant to
place the Barony of Ikerrin under the Insurrec-
tion Act.

The townland of Balrath, in the County
Meath, being restored to peace, the Extraordi-
nary Police is ordered to be withdrawn, by Pro-
clamation issued in Council on Wednesday last.

Yesterday, the Rev. C. P. Coote sent to the
County Jail, William Andrews and Cornelius
Ryan, charged, under the Insurrection Act, as
being idle and disorderly.

Yesterday morning, Thomas Barry, Michael
Barry, Mathew Murphy, James Russell, and
James Dineen, the two former convicted at
Rathkeale, and latter three in the County Court,
under the Insurrection Act, were sent off from
the Jail, to be embarked at Cork for Botany
Bay; there to remain seven years.
