Limerick, Ardferd and Aghadoe. By Doctor Jebb's promotion he will vacate the Archdeaconry of Emly, and the united livings of Abington and Tough in the Diocese of Emly and County of Limerick.

On Monday last, an Inquisition was taken in St. Francis's-Abbey, on the body of Mathew Magrath, who died the preceding evening, before the Right Worshipful Denis Fitz-Gerald Mahony, Mayor, and Sir Christopher Marrett, Magistrates of the County Limerick. It appeared in evidence, that some time since a dog was stolen from one of the vessels at our quays, by a person living within a short distance of the residence of Magrath, who caused the dog to be re-stolen soon after, and sent to the country for security. About ten days since, the dog was brought back, and the original thief immediately demanded it as his property, which, not being acceded to, he struck Magrath a violent blow with a stone above the left shoulder, which caused his death. The Jury returned a verdict accordingly, and the Magistrates have issued a warrant for the apprehension of those concerned in the fatal occurrence. Thus has a violation of law, comparatively of little moment, ended in the heinous crime of murder! A dreadful lesson of the certain consequence which awaits a deviation from morality, which, however apparently trivial in its commencement, steals on the offender, step by step, ultimately leads him to crime, and terminates in ignominious punishment.

Monday last, a Petty Sessions of the County Magistrates, in the district of Abington, was held, when the conduct of Michael Hogan, a soldier, who fired at an individual on the day when Coffee was apprehended, was inquired into, the result of which is, that Hogan was ordered to be fully committed to Jail for trial at the next Assizes.

They entered his bed-room, and having covered his head with part of the bed clothes, threatened to deprive him of life if he offered to make the least noise or resistance—Two of the party were then placed as sentinels over him, and the remainder ransacked his desk and took away cash and notes to the amount of thirty-six pounds.
