His manners were polished, cheerful and unassuming, which gave a zest to his society that quitted him many but never lost a friend; and this was more particularly observed and felt at his own hospitable board. Surrounded by the tears and prayers of his afflicted family, and relying on the sufferings and prayers of his, his spirit has changed its abode, we fondly hope, to enjoy repose in the mansions of the just.
