On Tuesday night, the ruffians who visited several Houses in the North Liberties, as stated in our last, repaired to the dwelling of Mr. Walnut, sen. at Maryfield, and took therefrom a musquet and sword.

In consequence of the outrages in the North Liberties of this City, a detachment of Captain Drought's Police and a few of the 42d Highlanders are stationed at the Flanker-house.

A party of men attacked several houses in the North Liberties of Cork, on Wednesday night, in search of fire-arms. The house of John Daly was burned, and his cow houghed by the ruffians.

A reward of Ninety Pounds is offered in this day's Chronicle for the apprehension of the murderers of Joseph Condon, an under-steward on Earl Egremont's property, in this County, as stated in a former publication.

On Tuesday last, Captain Burke, having armed a party of between thirty and forty men, went to drive for tithes near Killoale. On their return, they were attacked by the country people, who rescued the cattle, and succeeded in taking the arms from Captain Burke's men, who fired upon the assailants, and wounded two of them. Half of the arms have been restored to Major Purdon.

On Tuesday, Connor Gleeson had his skull fractured in a riot which took place at his brother's wedding at Guig, in this County. He is now in the County Infirmary.

The Munster Circuit will positively commence at Ennis, on Monday, the 3d of March, and at Limerick, on Friday, the 7th.

A. C. Macartney, Esq. King's Counsel, arrived at Molony's Hotel, yesterday, on his way to preside at the Sessions under the Insurrection Act at Tralee.

Yesterday, the Corporation of this City unanimously voted the Freedom to Capt. Drought, accompanied with a vote of thanks for his gentlemanly and efficient conduct in the command of the Police in this district.

This day the Lord Bishop of Limerick was enthroned at the Cathedral, in the presence of several of the Clergy, and a numerous congregation.
