Lieutenant General, and General Governor of Ireland, PROCLAMATION.

In an Act passed in the Third Year of His Majesty, entitled "An Act for the Appointment, and to secure the effectual Performance of Office, &c." it is amongst other things therein under the provisions of the said Statute, County, City or Town in Ireland, the Constables or Sub-Constables for each County, and the Lord Lieutenant, or other Governors of Ireland, shall under the said Act, have named the Chief Constable in any such County, City or Town, a being the same, shall thereupon be made settlement, or other Chief Governor or Lieutenant in the Dublin Gazette; and an Act of the Thirty-second year of His Majesty the Third, for regulating the Office of Constables, better enforcing the process of Criminals in Ireland; an Act of the Fifty-fourth year of His Majesty, for the better execution and by appointing Superintending Magistrates in certain cases; and so the Fifty-ninth year of the said late King, in pursuance of the operation of the several Fines upon Townlands and places in Ireland relating to the unlawful distillation of spirituous liquors, and to provide for the prevention or suppression of such offences, appointment, and support of extraordinary Justice, in manner therein mentioned, they affect such County, City or Town, led, say so far as any of them respects any office, or charge, matter or thing therein, hereby the Magistrates in the Commission be County of Limerick in Ireland, being the Justice Town of the said County, pursuant to that purpose, hearing date the 10th of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two, in the County of Limerick, in the Dublin Gazette, on the 10th day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two, have duly nominated twenty-six Constables and Sub-Constables of Limerick, being the Numbers of such Sub-Constables respectively specified, in the part of the said Warrant, by Warrant appointed Eight Chief Constables in the said
